#### 1. Depression-

- A. Father loses their house, furniture, and the family forced to move in with his mothers' parents.
- B. His father was a teacher, could not find work, unemployed for two years. Did not have much, but did eat well.
- C. Movement of people from the City to the Rural areas for food. Radio used but limited because of lack of batteries.
- D. Remembers the Joe Lewis fight. No electricity, phone.
- E. No rememberance of the stock market crash.
- F. First dollar larger than the present dollar. Issued after the bank holiday.
- G. Programs remembered: NRA, WPA, AAA.
- H. His Uncle worked on a road crew for the WPA
- I. Tells of Roosevelt's voice and compares him to ministers.
- J. Says Roosevelt is a good leader, people look to him for help. Most of his programs were not good, but he tried.
- K. Many people giving up, shifting around, looking for work.
- L. Squatters and "Shaddie" towns pop up during the depression.
- M. Sharecropping gains strength in some areas, but most did not have the tools for sharecropping. Many people had gotten land form homesteading. Hard to rise above share-cropping because of financial problems and bad crops.
- N. Country stores become big and many people owe them.
- 0. Felt the depression was beginning to be over in 1937,
- 38, 39. Felt some people were coming out of it then.
- P. Father moved to Valley Head and became a teacher.

Q. His father also worked for a Roosevelt Agricultural program

Measuring land. Felt the depression was almost over

for his family.

#### World War II

  - F. Home Front situation: Ration coupons for sugar, shoes, general food, and a shortage of rubber for his fathers tires.
- G. Many shortages on the home front, compares it to the depression After the War:
- A. Went to college(Jacksonville State Univ.) became a teacher.
  - B. Went on the G.I. Bill. They would not let become anything except a teacher because of the shortages.
  - C. Dr. Stone got him a job after he got out.

#### Segregation in the South:

- A. Segregation was a way of life in the South.
  - B. The further South you went, the more pronounced it Became.
  - C. Schools segregated. The black children had to be sent Thirty miles to the nearest black school.
