Dr. C. W. Daugeette Has Built Great School From Almost Nothing

JACKSONVILLE, Ala., Aug. 9.—The greatest array of prominent people ever to assemble in one body perhaps will be seen in the semi-centennial celebration of the State Teachers College Friday. JACKSONVILLE, Ala., Aug. 9.—Under the leadership of Mayor Charles A. "Teachers are the only hope of the world."
That is the philosophy upon which Dr. C. W. Daugeette, president of the State Teachers College, Jacksonville, has built his entire life, for since early manhood he has devoted himself to training others to go out into the world to do the work of teachers, whose profession in comparison with the unselfish motives of its members is probably the most thankless of all others.

The thing which most impresses one about this man who became president of his college at the age of 27 is his complete modesty. When questioned about his accomplishments, "The Doctor," as he is known to thousands who have come in contact with him, is continually turning the conversation from himself to discuss teacher training and teachers colleges. At the first mention of the subject he is apt to enthusiastically tell of the fight of his and similar institutions in the state for their existence through 20 sessions of the Alabama Legislature. For there have been few sessions of the past 50 years, either regular or special, at which the subject of abolishing or combining the four teacher training schools in Alabama has not been brought up. And in every fight against the institutions, Dr. Daugeette has been in the forefront of those who advocate their continued existence.

His Life Work

One cannot depict his life without at the same time telling the story of the college at Jacksonville, and vice versa. For the two are so entwined and intermingled that one might say that they are one and the same. Born in 1873, he graduated from Auburn in 1894 and went to Jacksonville in the same year as teacher. Five years later he was made president of what was then only a small local college with eight boarding students. Today he is president of one of the outstanding teacher training institutions of the South with an annual enrollment of 2,500.

Grew Rapidly

In 1900, an old abandoned college and the remains of a courthouse no longer needed for county government composed the buildings of the school. Today it owns a group of modern up-to-date buildings situated on a high hill overlooking its former site. And somehow during this progress up the hill one seems to sense that he didn't cling to the college as it went up, but that the college clung to him in his march upward.

On a Tangent

But the writer, like The Doctor, seems to be prone to forget what he started out to tell—something about himself—and to have gotten into a hopeless tangle of progress, teacher training, etc., just as his subject often does. The reason for this is that only by persistent and repeated questioning can one find out anything concerning his personal habits, while a chance remark may bring forth an hour's dissertation on facts and figures which prove the value of teacher training.

At 61 he is still as vigorous, as ambitious for "the college," and as hard-working as one can imagine. (Continued on page 8, column 1)

Jacksonville College Has Graduated 2,425 Persons Since 1896

Pupils to Receive Aid of Government

JACKSONVILLE, Ala., Aug. 9.—President C. W. Daugeette of Jacksonville State Teachers College has received authority to appoint a committee to pass upon applications of students who seek Federal aid in attending school this year.

The pageant will depict the growth of the institution during the last 50 years and various groups of the students will be in skits representing different phases of the time.

State Teachers College and Townsfolk Ready for Big Celebration Friday

JACKSONVILLE, Ala., Aug. 9.—All Jacksonville is ready for Friday—one of the biggest days in the city's history. Thousands of visitors are expected here tomorrow to attend the mammoth semi-centennial celebration at the State Teachers College.

The school and the townsfolk have united in a single effort to present an entertaining, educational and impressive program which will last a big part of the day.

A free barbecue will be served at noon and plenty of music will be on the program of entertainment, both the 69th Coast Artillery Band of Fort McClellan and the 167th Infantry Band of Gadsden having accepted invitations to take part.

Miller to Take Part

The celebration will bring to Jacksonville the present chief executive, Governor B. M. Miller, the Governor-designate, ex-Governor Bibb Graves, and three other former Governors, W. W. Brandon, Thomas E. Kilby and Charles Henderson. The assemblage of these men is one of the most unique on the program and is one of the few times that five Governors have been brought together on a program.

The day's program will begin with speeches by distinguished educational leaders. Dr. A. F. Harman, State Superintendent of Education; Dean P. P. Burns, Howard College, and Dr. Bruce Payne, Peabody College, will deliver addresses.

A parade will be held following the barbecue and students, former students and friends of Jacksonville State Teachers College will march to martial music of the two military bands.

Masons Have Part

Masons of the district are expected to take a special place in the parade. Grand Master Samuel Moore, Gadsden, will be here. Masons conducted the ceremony at the laying of the cornerstone at Hames Hall several years ago.

A motor caravan of automobiles will transport citizens from Gadsden to attend the celebration and many persons from Sand Mountain also are expected to attend.

Thomas G. Coleman, manager of the Ritz Theatre of the Public-Wilby group of theatres in Anniston, has contacted news reel companies in Atlanta and portions of the celebration are expected to be recorded by the motion picture camera.

J. Preston Rogers of the National Magazine of Commerce has notified President C. W. Daugeette that a story on the progress of the school will be published soon.

Scores of citizens have joined members of the faculty and student body of the State Teachers College in plans for the celebration.

Florence Is Oldest Teachers College

Of the four teacher training institutions in Alabama, the one at Florence is the oldest, having been founded in 1873. The colleges at Jacksonville and Livingston are Twins, both were founded in 1883, while Troy is the baby of the family since it did not have its beginning until 1887.

FOURTH ESTATE IS GIVEN SPECIAL BARBECUE BID

Youth's Ability Doubted But Now He Is President

JACKSONVILLE, Ala., Aug. 9.—Thirty-five years ago, young people with college degrees were not as numerous in proportion to the population as they are today, and a youthful looking man bearing the qualifications to teach in a higher institution was rare.

In 1894, forty years ago, Dr. C. W. Daugette, who now is president of the State Teachers College, went to Jacksonville, having received a letter from Jacob Forney, president of the college, informing him he had been elected to the faculty.

Dr. Forney was not quite certain about Dr. Daugette's ability, the latter bearing a youthful appearance. For a few days, Dr. Daugette was not permitted to teach, but was assigned to classes for observation of the work.

However, Dr. Daugette was added to the faculty and his record for the first few years was so good that he was made president of the

school. He has remained at the helm since that time and the institution has grown steadily.

The following is the letter, dated October 8, 1894, which Dr. Forney wrote to Dr. Daugette:

"I am authorized by Capt. Wm. M. Hames, president of Board of Directors of State Normal School, to announce that at a meeting of the Board this morning, you were elected to a position on the faculty of the school. You will be given work next Tuesday, the sixteenth of October and the salary is \$60 per month of four weeks, eight months work in the present session.

"I have not written to you sooner fearing to raise your expectations uselessly. I have had considerable trouble in carrying my point with the trustees, a good deal of pressure being brought to bear upon them in other directions.

"I congratulate the school, and you upon your election, and I feel proud of my own action in the mat-

ter. While the salary is not what I had hoped to offer you, still I think that you can feel assured of an advance upon this offer for the next session's work.

"It would be useless to go into particulars of the work in this letter. I hope to see you by the last of this week and get you in harness for your next Tuesday's beginning.

"The general outline of your work is this: Four science classes. Freshman class, Physical Geography and Botany; Sophomore class, Physiology and Physics; Junior class, Chemistry and Dynamical Geology; Senior class, Structure and Historical Geology and Astronomy. We try to present the elements of the sciences and show how they may be studied in the common schools of the land. Very little of apparatus is with us, but I hope to fit up a good chemical laboratory this fall. You will have some work in superintending the experimental work and in laying out terraces and filling up ditches and gulleys. Your education at Auburn will be given full opportunity for practice.

"I presume that with the changes which your presence will effect, that you will have about seven or eight periods of work with two or three periods idle.

"I feel sure that you will like the field opened up to you here, and I know that the school will be benefited by your election.

"Mr. Wright and I are both young men, graduates of the University of Alabama, and we have our reputations to make as well as you. I am sure that we then can make a big success of the school and bring our names and fames prominently before the people of this state in the course of a very few years.

"Hoping to see you soon, and in the expectation of a long, pleasant, and profitable school work with you, I am

Property Valuation \$430,000 Above Appropriations From the State

Buildings and lands of the State Teachers College, Jacksonville, have shown a steady increase since the school's funding until today the valuation of property is slightly over \$1,000,000, although during the history of the school the total appropriations from the state total only \$570,000.

Gifts and buildings built by the school under the direction of Dr. C. W. Daugeite have accounted for the \$430,000 additional property now owned by the institution.

The first landmark in the acquiring of the property was the turning over of the buildings and land which belonged to old Calhoun College in 1886. In 1900 this was followed by the gift of the old Calhoun County courthouse after the county seat had been moved to Anniston.

Hames Hall was the first large building to be built for the college and this edifice, which is now used as an armory by the National Guard, was completed in 1908.

Weatherly Hall was completed in 1916 and is the dormitory for women. In 1925 the college began using Forney Hall, the men's dormitory, which was completed in that year and contains 76 bedrooms for men students.

Daugeite Hall, the central dormitory for women was completed soon afterwards and Kilby Hall was doubled in size without aid from the state.

The climax to the building program of Teachers College came in 1930 when Bibb Graves Hall was completed, giving the school much needed space for class rooms and administration offices.

The Jacksonville High School building has also been acquired by the college and it is valued at \$16,000.

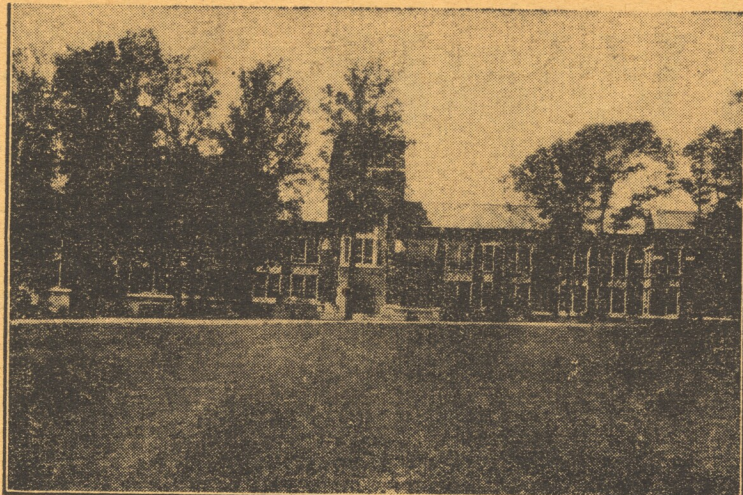
Jacksonville Gave 206 Military Drills

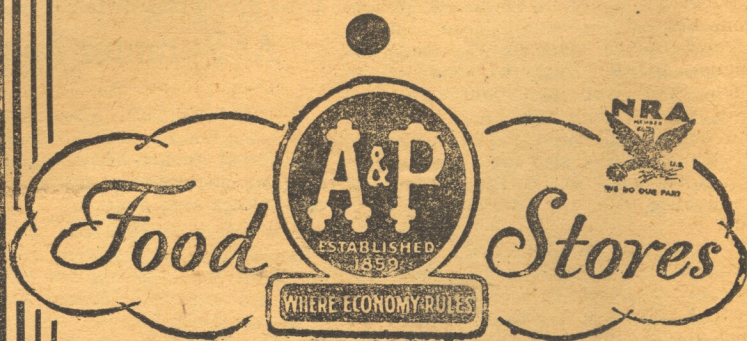

he was when he became president of the school at an age when most college presidents are still carrying books to classes under their arms. When his duties permit, he may be found on the tennis court playing against students or members of his family and deriving not-too-obvious pleasure when he defeats his younger opponents, which is very often. He finds time for a wide range of activity outside of his college duties and the list of his civic, religious, fraternal and educational connections reads more like a combination of those of at least three men. At present the Junior Warden of St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Jacksonville, he has also served in the capacity of treasurer; a past master of Hiram Masonic Lodge No. 42; Past Grand Master of Odd Fellows of Alabama; organizer and past president of the Alabama Reading Circle for teachers; past president of the Jacksonville Exchange Club; past president of the Alabama Educational Association; and city superintendent of education, which position he combines with the presidency of the college.

Married in Jacksonville

Soon after coming to Jacksonville, Dr. Daugeite married Annie Forney, daughter of the late General John H. Forney, whose name is written indelibly across the pages of Confederate history. Mr. Daugeite is a graduate of the college and also attended the Academy of Design in New York and Cooper Union. Her family, too, has contributed much to the success of S. T. 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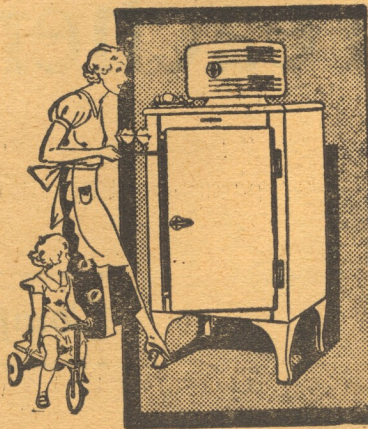
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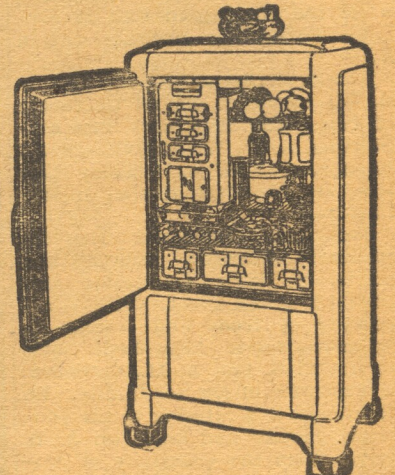

tutions, and they only when in active opposition.

Capacity for Work

His capacity for work seems unlimited. For instance, with all of the hundreds of details to be handled in connection with the coming celebration, he is continually being consulted on all sides about this and that—"Where to get beards for the Governors?"—"Have you arranged transportation for the bands?" And there is always a ready answer for every question regardless of its triviality.

The S. T. C. president combines that rare combination of the administrator and educator. Without state aid and with funds almost snatched out of the air, he has built and enlarged buildings far beyond the value of the money he has actually received. Forney Hall, the men's dormitory, the last wing to Kilby Hall and the new wing to Weatherly Hall were built without state aid.

In the last Legislature he vigorously fought an effort to have the four teacher training institutions in the state combined. In a speech made in the committee meeting where the proposal was being reviewed he said in part, "only 49 per cent of all our teachers have had two years of college training which is recognized everywhere as the minimum. Every college in the state could spend all of its time raising the standards of the other 51 per cent for years before Alabama would rank where it should in education. Over 80 per cent of our students have already been teachers and are attending only to raise their standards. Alabama needs more instead of fewer teacher colleges."

The "Jacksonville Spirit" which is known wherever S. T. C. is known, is somehow part of The Doctor and his family. He never seems to need to command; always a hint is sufficient. A number of

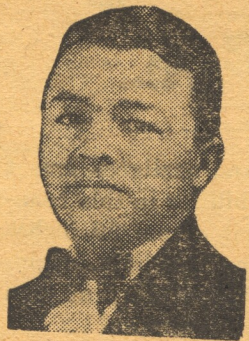

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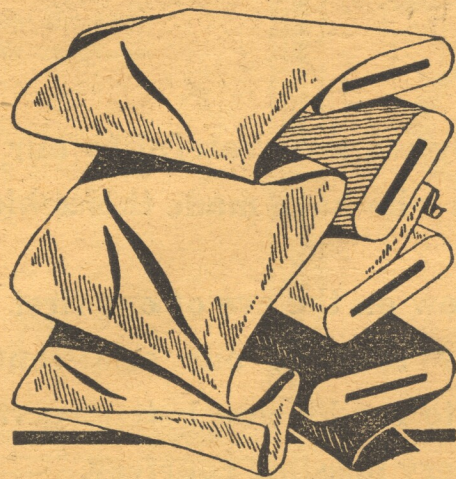

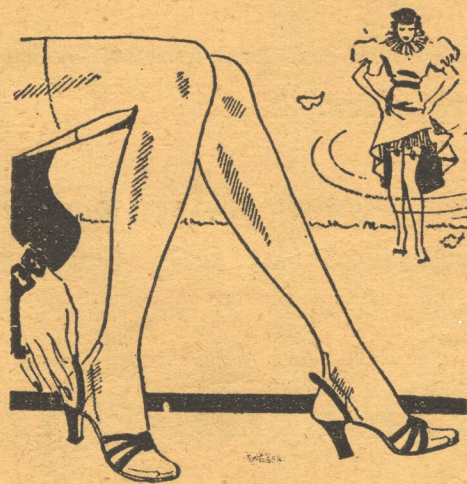
