"A Little United Nations" might best describe this unique program.

Actually, the International Program is a Department of State- approved program in international information, education, understanding, appreciation and exhange of ideas and cultural knowledge,

Students from many countries around the world-- along with a similar number of American students-- make up the membership of the program, All of the students are enrolled with a full load of academic courses.

In addition, the students also take part in a series of forums, seminars, and social eventsformal as well as informal. This enables the students to learn about cultural habits, customs, attitudes, and ideals of all the students enrolled in the program.

Foreign students are carefully selected and all are given some type of scholarship. The American students in the program are also required to meet certain standards, but pay all their college expenses.

Each foreign student has an America roommate, and all students are required to invite persons from outside the program to many of the social events.

The foreign and American students usually become good friends, perhaps moreso than the average dormitory roommates.

There are currently

200-former members of the International House Program residing in 68 foreign countires.

Those who are acquainted with the International House Program recognize it as a "person to person" laboratory in human understanding and appreciation.

Its representatives from 18 countries, who profess 12 different faiths, respect each other's religion, whill several of the countrie are at war with eac other.

In short, Internationa House is a family of youn; men and women learning living, working and play ing together. These students believe in the motto of International House "Know one another and you will love one another."

To Meet Growing Student Needs

Jacksonville State University has added several degrees to its curriculum since attaining university status Nov. 22, 1966.

Jax State now offers bachelor of science, bachelor of arts and bachelor of science in education degrees. In addition, the master of arts and master of science degrees are offered in several fields.

Graduate students may obtain the master of arts degree in history, English, political science and music. The master of science degree is offered in chemistry, btology and mathematics, and the master of science degree in education is offered in music, math, science, English, counseling, and physical education.

As a result of this new program, both degree and registered nurse certificates are now offered.

In order to obtair more doctorate degree holders, JSU is cooperating with Duke, Emory and Vanderbilt universities in a program known as DEV.

Eleven Jax State pro -Jax State took over the fessors are currently enrolled at the three universities earning their doctor's degrees, federal government pays for the faculty replacements, and those participating receive their regular salaries.

There are currently 5,000 students enrolled at Jax State, and 67 faculty and staff members were added this year to meet this in creased enrollment.

Inthe early 1960's. a campaign was begun to expand the International House Program, and to raise funds for a new building to house an expanded program,

The present International House - - the most unique building on campus - - is an outgrowth of these efforts. The board of trustees or the International Endowment Foundation raised approximately \$200,000 toward construction and furnishings of the build-

campaign to raise tunds to build the new building,

In October of 1964. the new Colonial - styled building was dedicated. Dr. Woodrow Wilson Sayre, grandson of President Woodrow Wilson, was the featured speaker at the dedication ceremonies. About 1400 persons attended the dedication and open house.

The new International House has living accommodations for 40 stu dents. In addition, there are ample living rooms. memorial rooms, offices and study rooms. The International House is also equipped with a large kitchen, and dining room. which is the scene of various college functions.

The thing which makes their friendship unique is this -- Said is a Jordanian Christian and Gijsbert is a Jew from Holland, While the Jews and Arabs are at war, these two students have become close friends through understanding of each other,

No foreign student who enrolls in the International House Program is asked or expected to conform to American ways of life. Students at the "Little U. N." are more interested in learning about customs than they are in changing them, Many foreign students wear their native costumes to class.

Foreign students are not restricted to take part in the wide variety of JSU functions, One In - ternational House student recently made the college tennis team, and another won first place in the Miss Mimosa Beauty Pageant, the annual contest sponsored by the JSU yearbook. They take part in parades, special shows, and the Student Government Association, the governing body of JSU.

In short, they are finding out in person what American democracy is really all about, Many are surprised to find it totally different from the way it has been broadcast to the world in recent years by news medias preoccupied by only the bad things.

The only sad thing about the International House Program happens at the end of each semester when students complete their work and have to return to their home lands. It is sad for the students to leave, but they must. Although many will never see their friends of International House again, the friendship the memories and the knowledge they received at Jax State will go with them to the four corners of the world.

It is the simple things that are making the International House Program successful at JSU -things like Said and Gljsbert's friendship--things like a compact car, whose passengers include a Lebanese Moslem, an Israeli Jew, a Jordanian Christian, a German Catholic and an Alabama Baptist.

This brings to mind a serious question, If all the races of the world can live together in harmony under one roof, then why can't nations do accordingly?

If enough students participate in programs like International House at Jacksonville State University, then maybe someday the world can have lasting peace.

As the International House motto says: "To know someone is to love someone".

Several new buildings are currently under construction to meet the increase in enrollment and added curriculum.

A new \$1 million science hall was recently dedicated, and construction is well underway on a new student commons building and another girl's dormitory. The new dorm will be the 14th on the JSU campus, and will provide housing for 250 students.

Ground will be broken in the near future for a business administration building, and architects recently released a sketch of a seven-story library that is planned adjacent to the new

Each two weeks a "Gem of the Hills" is selected and featured in the college newspaper, The Chanticleer.


CIVIC MINDED






Jax State Cheerleaders lead the yells for all football and basketball games which the "Fighting Game-cocks" play.





And should your taste run along the spectator line, playing in the band, or cheerleading, there's also a place for you at Jax.



Jacksonville cheerleaders are chosen by the student body. A new election is held each year. Band members and ballerinas are chosen by a committee after a series of tryouts.



Architects have completed preliminary plans for a field house which will seat over 5,000 people and a football stadium with a seating capacity of 25,000.
