


## **JSU History Professor Launches New Book**



Dr. George M. Lauderbaugh, Associate Professor of History at Jacksonville State, was recently invited to the launch of his new book, The United States and Ecuador: Conflict and Convergence, 1830-1946 at the Ecuadorian Academy of History in Quito Ecuador.

The reception was hosted by the Corporation for the Development of University Education the publisher of the book in its Spanish edition, Los Estados Unidos y Ecuador: Conflicto y Convergencia, 1830-1946.

The book was introduced by Mr. Timothy Zúñiga-Brown the acting head of the US Embassy in Ecuador ( the ambassador's position is currently vacant). Dr. Carlos Espinosa of the School of Latin American Social Sciences -Ecuador provided an historical analysis of the book.

Dr. Espinosa related that Lauderbaugh's book was thoroughly researched, balanced, well organized, and easy to read. In addition Espinosa found that book covered new ground due to the research done the people of Ecuador in military archives that who treated me with such

had been previously untapped. Dr. John Sanbrailo, the Executive Director of the Pan-American Development Foundation and the former Director of USAID- Ecuador also commented on the books value to providing an objective account of US -Ecuadorian relations.

attended by Ecuadorian and American scholars, US Embassy Personnel, and many friends including recent JSU graduate Estefanía Bohorquez and her family.

In his speech to the academy Lauderbaugh related that his book really had its beginnings in 1962 when he was an exchange student in Quito.

"I fell in love with the country and especially kindness during my exchange," said Lauderbaugh. "When I retired from the Air Force and entered graduate school at the University of Alabama I decided to write my dissertation on a period of US- Ecuadorian relations. I was especially honored to have my host mother from 1962, Fina Durini de Paz, attend the presentation and I dedi-

cated the book in her honor and in memory of her hus-Alejandro band, Maldonado." Paz

"My wife, Sue, and I also hosted Ecuadorian Air Force officers when they attended the Air War College at Maxwell

AFB in Montgomery and they returned the favor by hosting us during numerous trips to Ecuador and it was an honor to have two of the officers attend the presentation," he continued. "I hope the book contributes to a clearer understanding of the mostly friendly relations that the United States and Ecuador have experienced over the years."

The JSU Emergency Alert System phone number reflected on your caller I.D. will be (256) 782-8558. Please program this number into your phone so you will immediately recognize it as an alert from the JSU Police Department.

In addition to the traditional communication modalities of voice and text message, Connect-Ed supports notification via social media and RSS. If you miss a call from the JSU Alert number (256-782-8558), you have additional options for receiving emergencyrelated information.

Messages sent through the Emergency Notification System will automatically post to JSU's offical Facebook page and Twitter account.

The process by which users sign up to receive emergency notification from the University remains the same. If you wish to be notified in the event of a campus emergency or would like to change the number at which you receive notifications, please follow these steps:


- Log on to MyJSU (http://my.jsu.edu/)
- Click on Contact Information

- Click on the Cell Phone link under the Mailing section
- Enter today's date in the Valid From This Date field
- Scroll down to Phone Type
- Click on the drop down list and choose Cell Phone (Even though you must choose cell phone, any number can be put here; i.e. home, work, cell.)
- Enter the phone number at which you would like to be contacted during an emergency.
- Click Submit

If you provided the number for a phone that is SMS-enabled, you will be automatically subscribed to text messages. Anytime your personal information changes please be sure to update the information in your MyJSU account.

## JSU Men's Basketball take care of Bama State

Last Friday night the Gamecock men's basketball team hosted the Hornets of Alabama State. The in-state rivalry had gone 14 years since the last meeting between the two schools which was an overtime thriller in 1997 that finished with JSU taking a two point win.

The Gamecocks entered at 1-2 while the Hornets at 0-3 were still searching for their first 'W'. Both teams were a part of the Global Sports Challenge, a five team tournament, which saw both teams take losses from Marshall and No. 20 Cincinnati.

The first half opened with Stephen Hall scoring the first four points of the game giving JSU an early 4-0 lead. Tarvin Gaines took control from there hitting a few shots, and for the most part led the Gamecocks the rest of the game. Alabama State kept it close but only by knocking down the outside shot. Besides two layups and three free throws, the Hornets only got first half points by three pointers. With three minutes to go in the half the game was tied at 28, and after an ASU free throw was 28-29 in favor of the Hornets. Jacksonville State went on a 6-0 run to end the half and take a 34-29 lead at the break. The Hornets shot 7-17 (41.2 percent) from three point range in the first half which kept it close, but only being able to shoot 30 percent from that range in the second limited their chances. The Gamecocks picked up the second half where they ended the first and started a 5-0 run and extended their lead to ten, 39-29, and never looked back. The lead would later grow to fifteen, and never get closer than nine when ASU gave one last push.

The Gamecocks won by a final of 78-65. Dion Walters and Grant White were key members of the bench who helped JSU's bench outscore ASU's by twenty. Still, Junior Tarvin Green was the story of the night as he collected a doubledouble scoring 30 and grabbing 11 rebounds to help JSU outrebound the Hornets 40-19.

Green is the first JSU player to score 30 or more in two seasons. Coach James Green was pleased by the performance saying, "Tarvin did a really nice job for us tonight in what was a good win for our team."

In renewing the in-state rivalry Jacksonville State took a 6-2 lead in the series. The Gamecocks also evened up their season record at 2-2 and

#### Lady Gamecocks rolls over LeMoyne-Owens College

They built a double digit lead during the first half with Destiny Lane shooting from long range draining three of her four three pointers before the second half approached.

The red and white were leading 42-33 at halftime and needed to keep the same pace of intensity. LeMoyne was eager to start the second half as they picked up their energy to pressure the lady gamecocks causing 12 second half turnovers. At the 13:06 mark, the 17 point lead built up by JSU was cut to only a 6 point lead leaving the score 56-50.

As time kept ticking, Lady Gamecocks turned up the intensity creating steals and forcing turnovers as they did in the first half. Lane sunk another three pointer with more than six minutes remaining giving them a 13 point lead. She ended her night with 21 clutch points. Danielle Vaughn also put in hard work to get herself a double double with 27 points and 12 rebounds. The freshman Briana Morrow helped Vaughn on the block earning her first double double ever with 13 points and 12 rebounds. JSU came out on top of the Magicians 83-67 with a much needed win. "We appreciate the support of our fans and will we strive to get better everyday," said Coach Watts. The Thanksgiving Classic is coming up this week and the Lady gamecocks will be preparing for their opponents as they strive for victory.

### Five Gamecocks Earn All-OVC Football Honors

BRENTWOOD, Tenn. – Jacksonville State placed five players on the Ohio Valley Conference Football All-Conference teams, as selected by the league's coaches and sports information directors.

Washaun Ealey (RB) and Jamison Wadley (DL) were named first-team All-Ohio Valley Conference, while Monte Lewis (DL) and A.J. Davis (DB) both earned second-team All-OVC honors. Freshman Max Holcombe (C) and Ealey were both named to the All-Newcomer team.

Ealey became Jacksonville State's 10th player in school history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a single-season after rushing for 1,082 yards on 178 carries. The Stillmore, Ga., native averaged 108.2 yards per game and was second on the team with nine touchdowns, including eight rushing touchdowns and one receiving.

Wadley, one of three captains for the Gamecocks, was a second-team selection in 2010. The Attalla, native started all 11 games and had 45 tackles, including a team-high 10 tackles for loss and a team-high four sacks. Lewis, from Abbeville, started all 11 games for Jax State and finished with 32 tackles, including 28 solo stops. He also finished with seven tackles for loss and added a pair of sacks, a forced fumble and one blocked kick.

Davis finished with 28 tackles on the season, all solo stops, and was second on the team with two interceptions. The former Clay-Chalkville High School product, also had five passes defended, three pass breakups, and one fumble recovery.

Holcombe, a freshman from Hillcrest High School in Tuscaloosa, played 790 plays and graded out at 91 percent on the season. He finished with 56 knocdowns and 13 pancake blocks after starting all 11 games at center for the Gamecocks.

Jacksonville State finished the 2011 season with a 7-4 record, including a 6-2 Ohio Valley Conference mark, and won the school's 18th Conference Championship.

#### JSU's James Esco Earns OVC Honor

BRENTWOOD, Tenn. – Jacksonville State's James Esco was named the Ohio Valley Conference Special Teams Player of the Week, the league office announced on Sunday. Esco scored eight points by kicking in Jacksonville State's 38-16 road win over Tennessee State in the season-finale on Saturday.

The Leesburg, Ga., native kicked a 42-yard field goal and also added five extra points to help Jacksonville State claim the school's 18th conference championship. Esco hit his ninth consecutive field goal of the season with 1:23 left in the second quarter to extend JSU's halftime lead to 17-10.

Jacksonville State finished the 2011 season with a 7-4 record and a 6-2 Ohio Valley Conference mark, and moved back into the Top 25 football polls on Sunday at No. 25 in The Sports Network/Fathead.com poll. Jax State has been ranked for 11 weeks during the 2011 season.
