

Homecoming king, queen crowned

"I'm really excited," she said, "I'm honored to represent the faculty and student body of JSU. Throughout my campaign, I told people that there was nothing I'd like more. I'm just really excited!"

To be elected as Homecoming queen, Garner had to qualify for the top ten via the homecoming pageant held on October 15 and then two rounds of online voting.

Behind the glitz and glamour of homecoming, it is a very special campus organization: the SGA. SGA is responsible for organizing all the homecoming activities, from the homecoming pageant

to the homecoming parade itself. "I love the anticipation of the Homecoming king and queen announcement," said Brett Johnson, a senior majoring in Political Science and Communication and the 2014-2015 SGA president. On November 2, 2014, the International House invited students across campus to the annual UN Day Tea. The United Nations Day Tea is a celebration of the anniversary of the establishment of the United Nations.

The International House has been celebrating the establishment of the UN since the beginning of the holiday, and Sunday marked 60 years of commemorating the start of the UN.

Dr. Teresa Reed, the director of the International House program and a professor of the English department here at Jacksonville State University, first welcomed everyone in attendance.

Dr. John Ketterer, the director of the International House from 1999 to 2014, retired over the summer and was recognized for his service to the International House with the presentation of a plaque. His portrait is also being installed in the house.

Bricks for the new walkway beside the Alumni House will be engraved with both his and Christina Aguilar names. Aguilar is another International House retiree.

According to JSU Vice Provost Dr. Joe Delap, "The bricks not only provide a beautiful addition to the grounds, but also help provide scholarships to deserving students."

After recognizing several guests and then pre-

senting visiting scholars from universities located in China with plaques, Reed introduced the students of the International House with the following words.

"It was Dr. James Jones's belief that love and knowledge are keys for peace. This is the founding principle of the International House and one that we strive to live up to today. Know one another, and you will love one another. A world in which love and knowledge are the keys to life, instead of power grabs and conflicts, as we see so often today, is a world I would like to live in. And

every single day that is the world in this house, and the young people you're about to meet."

There are 41 students living in the International Housethissemester, with origins ranging from Jacksonville, Alabama, to Korea, to Austria, to Nigeria.

Reed said of the program, "The International House program is unique, and provides a unique experience for students to come together and get to know each other to form bonds of love."

After the introductions to the students, the main part of the program began. Performances from the students ranged from native African dances to Arabic rap. Each performance was presented by a group

of students. These students did not know the steps of the dances or the words to the songs, or even the language they were sang in, and so had to learn from the student native to the country the dance or song was from.

Maya-Nora Saaid, a resident assistant in the International House, said "The slogan for the International house is 'Know one another, and you will love one another.' That's what the house stands for. Everybody is the same, everyone is equal."

This motto was certainly well represented at this year's UN Day Tea. Each student who performed was dressed in traditional garb and embodied the idea of knowing their neighbor through knowledge of customs.







from high school, talk to friends studying abroad, or finally have that Skype session you've been meaning to have with your sibling.


Whether you choose to talk with friends online, on the phone, or face to face, a rainy day can give you the time you need to catch up with the important people in your life.

Faster feline flashbacks, PS4 updates in time for holidays

YouTube has recently introduced the capability to play videos in higher frame rates. For those who aren't familiar with tech lingo, think of the cat video you're watching as being a slide show that is moving so fast that your eye perceives it as natural motion. YouTube was previously capped at 30 frames per second.

This means that there were 30 individual "slides" in every second of video. Now users can upload at up to double the frame rate. This makes for much smoother video playback, and the difference immediately noticeable.

In order to take advantage of this, you'll have to be using Google Chrome or Safari 8 and select the 720p60 or 1080p60 option when watching a video. (It may work on some mobile browsers, but the desktop versions of Chrome and Safari are the only confirmed browsers at this point.)

This is especially good news for anyone who watches video game trailers or gameplays with any frequency. Until now a video could never be an exact representation of how a game will actually look when played if the game ran at a higher frame rate than 30fps.

In the near future, developers are sure to take advantage of the upgrade so that potential consumers can get a more accurate look at their product.

In other news, Sony rolled out PS4 firmware update 2.00 on October 28th. Verison 2.00, announced at Sony's Gamescom press conference back in August, is the PS4's first major update since its November 15 launch last year. It brought a heap of new and highly anticipated features to the console. Below is a brief overview of all the new functions.

- Share Play-One of the most touted new features, this allows you to take over the controls in a technology column comes out friend's game over the network. Themes-Users can now

download themes custom from the PlayStation Store. (There is no support for playeruploaded backgrounds as of yet.) - YouTube-Game footage can

- now be uploaded directly to youtube via the "Share" button on the Dualshock 4 controller, and the YouTube app is now available for download in the PlayStation Store.
- USB Music Support-Music playback from USB storage devices is now supported, but music still cannot be stored on the system's hard drive.
- Add to Library function-There is now an "Add to Library" button for the monthly PlayStation Plus free games. This way players can add the content to their account without having to download the game to the system, saving storage space.

These are the highlights of the update, and there are a few other minor improvements as well. However, the firmware also brought with it an unexpected issue. Many users have reported that putting the system in Standby Mode, which has been redubbed "Rest Mode" causes the system to freeze in the process of entering its low-power state.

The orange LED that indicates that the system is in Rest Mode continues to flash instead of glowing steadily as it should, and the system becomes unresponsive. If this happens, try holding down the power button on the system for ten seconds to perform a hard reset. It is advisable to shut the power completely off on the system instead of putting it in Rest Mode until Sony releases a patch to remedy the issue.

Marsh, Stewart ideas clash in debate before election day

The Justice and Civil Rights Initiative partnered with College Republicans and JSU College Democrats to hold a debate between the State Senate candidates Del Marsh and Taylor Stewart on October 29, 2014 at the Lela Sarrell Learning Center at Wallace Hall.

The debate gathered a crowd of an estimated 250 people that overflowed into the hallway and lobby of the building, with a promise of having some of their key questions answered regarding each candidate's campaign and strategies. Republican Senator Del Marsh and Democrat

topics discussed ranged raising the minimum wage to education funding Alabama public

Stewart's ideas of raising the minimum wage were met with remarks from Marsh regarding where that money would come from. Marsh argued that by raising the minimum wage, companies would not be able to keep as many employees.

"We can't start raising the minimum wage and then find at the end of the day that they lose those jobs," Marsh said.


Stewart said that the more money made by employees, the more those employees could afford to spend and give back into the economy, which in turn would create more money for companies to pay their employees.

Another major issue discussed was the education fund and problems within the education system, namely the Accountability Act, a major conversation starter in the campaign this year.

Stewart said this act has cost the state's public schools \$40 million, and claimed that much of that money went into scholarshipgranting organizations run by Marsh's cohorts. Marsh has been open about his plans to expand the program even more, thereby taking more

money from the public school's funding. "Who knows, it might be \$100 million next year," Stewart suggested as a possible cost of the act to the education fund.

Stewart accused Marsh of a lack of sincere concern for our students, teachers and schools. Stewart said that the district wanted and needed a

leader who cares about the area's public schools, and about proper funding for public schools more than scholarship funds run by their friends.

While the debate showcased the major differences in the beliefs of the two candidates, both candidates agreed upon the reform of the Alabama Constitution of 1901, the longest state constitution in the nation.

Marsh founded the Constitutional Revision Commission, a commission that planned to make many detailed changes to the state constitution.

Most of these changes have not been put into effect.

After Tuesday's elections, Marsh came the race victorious, beginning consecutive term in

The Gamecocks dropped two more conference matches over the weekend to Murray State on Friday night, and then to Austin Peay on Saturday afternoon.

Jacksonville State played their first match on Friday versus Ohio Valley Conference leader Murray State. Although the first set saw 17 ties between the two teams, the Racers would eventually take control to win it by two. The second set saw only six ties, and two lead changes, but the Gamecocks could not take control of the set and lost it to MSU. The Gamecocks made sure Homecoming was a success as they dominated Austin Peay 56-0. Although there was cold, windy weather, the fans still came out to see the Gamecocks as the attendance for the game reached 17,952.

"It was a little cool today, but I think everyone who came out had a good time," said head coach John Grass during the post-game interview.

The JSU defense was very impressive in their performance as they forced two turnovers and was awarded with the shutout. Troymaine Pope forced a fumble that Lawon Debardelaben recovered. DeBarriaus

Miller caught an interception and returned it for seven yards. The shutout was not only JSU first shutout of the season, but it was their first shutout since 2010. Coach Grass felt like the shutout was really impressive.

"In today's world of offenses, it's really hard to shut out," somebody Grass said.

The Gamecocks' offense was also impressive considering they scored eight touchdowns for 56 points. The 56-point margin of victory was Jacksonville State's biggest since beating Cumberland University 72-10 in 2001.

Jones led Jacksonville State with three of those eight touchdowns. Jones had a 4-yard touchdown run, a 21-yard touchdown run and a 22-yard touchdown run.

Running backs DaMarcus James and Pope both had touchdowns of their own. Pope scored the first touchdown of the game with a 9-yard run, while James scored the last touchdown of the game with a 2-yard run. James's touchdown run gave him 44 on his career and is still second for the school record of 48 by David Gulledge. James has also now rushed for 3,000 career yards which makes him the fourth JSU player to do so.

Jacksonville State quarterbacks Eli Jenkins and Christian Lemay also ran for a touchdown. Lemay's touchdown run went for seven yards and Jenkins touchdown run came from one-yard-out. Markis Merril caught a pass from Jenkins,

but fumbled it in the end zone. Bo Brummel recovered the fumble and was awarded with the touchdown.

The Gamecocks had 416 rushing yards and 239 passing yards. They set the school record for total offensive yards with 655.

"It was good to get a record, and it's always good to get 600-and-something yards of offense," said Grass.

The Gamecocks are now 7-1 overall and 5-0 in the conference. JSU is ranked No. 4 in this weeks Top 25 FCS Coaches Poll.

The next game for Jacksonville State is an away game against Eastern Kentucky. The game is set for 12 p.m. Live stats and game information can be found at jsugamecocksports.com.
