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Taylor Anne Beckham - Taylor wishes to bring attention to the Youth Health and Wellness pro-



NEWS JSU goes pink for breast cancer awareness

Breast Cancer Awareness Month is a worldwide campaign held in October to increase awareness for the early detection of breast cancer and to raise money for research dedicated to the prevention, treatment and cure of breast cancer.

During October, people often wear a pink ribbon or pink clothing to symbolize breast cancer awareness.

Susan G. Komen, a nonprofit breast cancer organization, holds races around the United States called "Race for the Cure" to help raise money for breast cancer and awareness. Their organization expects to have 14 international races in nine countries with nearly 140 races globally.

According to Breastcancer.org, about 1 in 8 women will develop invasive breast cancer over the course of their lifetimes and for women in the U.S., breast cancer death rates are higher than those for any other cancer, besides lung cancer.

The Cancer Treatment Centers of America urge women to be aware of some of the possible warning signs that they may have breast cancer, including skin swelling or redness, change in breast change, nipple discharge (other than breast milk), breast pain and flaking or dimpling skin.

Many women who have breast cancer do not experience any symptoms, which is why it is important to get regular mammograms.

Zeta Tau Alpha, a sorority at JSU, is doing an annual fundraiser for breast cancer education and awareness, which they have chosen as their philanthropy.

Each October, the Zetas 'paint the town pink' by hanging pink bows around Jacksonville and sells the bows to friends and fam-

ily. They also have 'Think Pink Week' full of several events like a 'Pound Away Breast Cancer' fitness class and a spirit night at Momma Goldberg's.

"ZTA wanted to chose a philanthropy that has effected so many people," said Savannah Tibbett, a member of ZTA. "That is why we are dedicated to helping raise awareness

and find a cure. One in eight women will be diagnosed with Breast Cancer in her lifetime, and that is why Zeta Tau Alpha chose a philanthropy that touches people all around us in a personal way. We hope our contributions will help find a cure for this disease or save someone from losing their life through early detection."

News Correspondent On Thursday, September 19, Dr. Emily Messer was named the new Vice President of Enrollment Management for Jacksonville State University.

JSU President John Beehler announced her promotion in an email to the student body, touting her prior leadership as the Associate Vice President for Enrollment Management.

"Under her leadership, the university's first-time freshman enrollment this fall is the highest it has been in recorded school history," said Beehler in the email.

Messer has two degrees from JSU: a Bachelor of Arts in English and a Master

of Public Administration. Messer also holds a Doctorate of Education in Higher Educa-Administration tion from The University of Alabama.

Messer has been working at JSU for a little over a year now, and since she began working at the university, JSU's first-time freshman enrollment has reached a record high.

When asked what her plans were to improve the admissions process at JSU in her new role as Vice President of Enrollment Management, Dr. Messer explained the progress that has already been made in her time at JSU.

Messer stated that cessful communication plans that include letters, emails, phone calls, and text messages to inform prospective students of the admissions process" have been implemented to make the process easier for students applying to the university.

Messer also said she is very excited about her new role and can't wait to continue her work improving the admissions process.

Over 80 percent of blind people can't find work, so when one is given a chance, it is more likely that they will be much more loyal and dedicated than the average sighted workers.

A blind person who has achieved the same qualifications as their sighted peers is, in a sense, more exceptional because it often takes them thrice as long to reach this point - that alone shows you how dedicated they are.

A blind person is more likely to have exceptional problem solving skills that those with sight do not. (We have to solve problems all our lives, everyday - practice does make perfect.)

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CAMPUS SGA passes hazing, Cabinet eligibility bills

The Jacksonville State University Student Senate voted to approve several bills: one that lays out the procedure for placing organizations that haze on probation and one that adds new requirements for members of the presidential cabinet.

Senate Bill 29, introduced by Sen. Justin Jones, states that organizations that are found in violation of university hazing policy and Alabama hazing laws can be put on probation by the SGA and receive sanctions from the Director of Community Standards and Student Ethics.

Organizations put on probation will be prohibited from attending the Organizational Council, a group where campus organizations receive information and updates on SGA and where smaller organizations grow.

The Director of Community Standards and Student Ethics is a university official and their role is to investigate infractions of the Student Code of Conduct.

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Sen. Jones said that the bill will bring the SGA and Code of Laws up to standard with the university policy and Alabama hazing laws.

"If an organization wants to be a part of the Or-

Student Ethics will also be able to impose sanctions."

Senator Matt Reed questioned Jones about what the probation entails for organizations that are placed on probation.

"They will not be able to attend [the Organizational Council] and, therefore, will not be able to receive allocations from them," said Jones.

According to Jones, the allocations refer to a reimbursement that organizations can receive from the SGA for money spent on an event or travel. Allocations are signed off by the Vice President of Organizational Affairs and can go up to \$600 per organization.

Additionally, the Student Senate passed SB 30, introduced by Sens. Dexter Ferguson and Cindy Danini, which puts in place additional requirements for individuals to meet before school they are seeking to represent, and must have completed 12 credit hours in that school. They must also be a full-time JSU student and cannot hold more than one cabinet position.

The bill establishing a Presidential Cabinet that was passed on Sept. 16 included a 2.5 GPA minimum.

"I think [the bill] enforces similar requirements and future proofs the selection of the Cabinet members so, that way, future presidents won't be able to add people there at their discretion," said Ferguson.

Reed raised a concern about online students not attending on-campus classes and asked if those students would still qualify for the Cabinet.

"I guess so," Danini replied.

Sen. Natalie Walls asked if the authors believed that President Herre-

might," said Ferguson. The Student Senate

passed the bill with no amendments and without any opposition.

Other business:

The SGA Senate passed a bill to change the last day to submit a bill to the Senate from the end of the business day Tuesday to the end of the business day Friday. The bill was tabled in the last meeting due to a typo.

The SGA Senate voted to approve SGA President Ulises Herrera's nomination of Kendal Featherstone to the Presidential Cabinet as a representative of the School of Business and Industry.

The SGA Senate tabled SGA President Ulises Herrera's nominations of José Riviera to the Presidential Cabinet as a representative of the School of Arts and Humanities and Amelia Walker to the Presidential Cabinet as a representative of the School of Education. The nominations were tabled due to the nominees being absent to the Senate meeting.

severe and extreme cases, such as when hazing results in death. Hazing rituals can frequently result in traumatic injuries. According to statistics from Hank Nuwer, a journalist dedicated to fighting against hazing, at least one death from hazing has occurred each year from 1969 to 2017.


According to The Economist, one of the leading causes from hazing related deaths is alcohol poisoning through forced consumption of alcohol. Physical hazing also frequently involves sexual abuse, wherein victims of hazing are made to perform sexual acts on each other or for senior members of an organization, such as a sorority or fraternity.

Psychological trauma from hazing is harder to track. Shame, self-doubt and threat of being ostracized by peers complicit in hazing can cause victims of

hazing to be unwilling to share their stories and the anguish they experience as a result of hazing. Statistics from insidehazing.com say that 9 out of 10 students who have experienced hazing behavior in college do not consider themselves to have been hazed.

The effects of hazing are no less real when they result in mental scars. Trauma of hazing can cause depression, suicide and lowered academic achievement. This may even cause victims to withdraw from other activities, not merely the activity around which the hazing is centered.

There are three steps to stopping hazing: recognition, preparation and action. Victims of hazing can be helped when onlookers recognize hazing as it happens around them, prepare to support and protect victims, and take action to institute policies that prevent,

Calhoun County launches new 911 texting service

Calhoun County 911 has implemented a new texting service known as Text-to-911 that became available to the residents of the county starting October 4.

Kevin Jenkins, the agency director of Calhoun County 911, explained how the system works.

"Text-to-911 allows a mobile cellular device to directly reach an emergency call taker by sending a text message to "9-1-1," said Jenkins. "Once contact to 9-1-1 is initiated, the GPS location of the device is usually available to 9-1-1 operators."

Calhoun County is stressing that this new texting service should not replace a traditional voice call in the event of an emergency. In fact, it is emphasized that voice calling is the best method for reaching emergency services.

"PLEASE remember a VOICE TELEPHONE CALL to 9-1-1 is always best." the department explained in a Facebook post. "Text-to-911 is most useful when it is unsafe to speak on the telephone."

"Text-to-911 is most beneficial when the caller cannot speak," said Jenkins. "Here are some examples where Textto-911 is advised: an emergency situation where the caller is unable to speak aloud for fear of their personal safety or instances where the caller has a hearing impairment."

The Facebook post also notes that it is an easier way for those who are hearing-impaired to contact them. Jenkins said they will greatly benefit when using the texting system.

"Hearing impaired person will greatly benefit by using

Text-to-911 because it does not require the use of translator services such as TDD/TTY equipment," said Jenkins. "This speeds accessibility to report an emergency."

Jenkins believes that there will be a significant impact on the community by using this new system.

"These innovations extend the 9-1-1 service of reporting an emergency to allow voiceless contact whenever the caller is unable to speak for whatever the reason," said Jenkins. "It is an enhancement to our ability to effectively protect the public and our citizens during an emergency."

Jacksonville State University Police Chief Rob Schaffer believes it will have great benefits for students.

"Texting has become a preferred way of communicating," said Schaffer. "Any system that can make students safer is a good one."

Animal Crossing





The acting is much better than many of the previous instalments. While some characters do come off a little flat in places you can really tell what certain characters are feeling just from the looks on their faces and even from the body language. It really helps to sell the mythos and the world as our new heroes meet the old ones with shock and awe. It's especially effective in earlier scenes where one of the characters has to emote using only his body language. You could really feel his fear and anguish, which made his lighter and happier scenes hit that much harder.

Tight end Trae Barry out for the season

In Jacksonville State's loss against Austin Peay on Sept. 28, junior tight-end Trae Barry suffered from a knee injury that eventually put him on crutches for the remainder of the game. Barry then sat out in last Saturday's win against Tennessee State. After having an MRI done, it was determined that he would have to sit out for the rest of the season.

Barry has been an integral part of the Gamecocks football program since his freshman year in 2017 and his absence could potentially cause a setback for the gamecocks for the remainder of the season.

As a true freshman, Barry started in three of the 11 games he appeared in as tight end. He was deemed a Freshman All-American by both Phil Steele and HERO Sports and was named All-Ohio Valley Conference Second Team on offense. Barry also caught 10 passes for 243 yards and recorded three touchdowns in his freshman year.

Barry made his first touchdown reception against Liberty on Sept. 23, 2017 at Burgess-Snow Field. This 80-yard touchdown catch was the seventh-longest catch in JSU history and the second-longest touchdown catch by a freshman.

In his Sophomore year, Barry made six starts in

his 12 appearances in 2018. He caught 32 passes for 503 yards and recorded a touchdown for the Gamecocks. His touchdown reception was a 44yard catch and run against Eastern Illinois. This touchdown was his longest reception of the year that resulted in a 49-22 win over the Panthers.

Barry was able to record his highest receiving yards in the 2018 game against Kennesaw State where he caught five passes for 115 yards. He also had multiple catches in seven of the 12 games that he appeared. Barry was eventually named All-Ohio Valley Conference First Team on offense and the HERO Sports Sophomore All-American Team in 2018.

In the current 2019-2020 season, Trae Barry has only continued to show out on the field. In just five matchups of the season, Barry has already recorded 330 yards and a touchdown for the Gamecocks. He was able to beat his career high in receiving yards in Jax State's second game of the season against the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, bringing in a whopping 151 yards.

Despite Barry's absence, Head Coach John Grass is confident that the team will still be able to do well in this Saturday's game against Eastern Illinois.

"[Eastern Illinois] hasn't won a game, but they have been in every game this season," said

Grass. "They are a well-coached team and they are adjusting to a new coach and new system and all that takes a part of where they are at as a football team. They are very capable of beating you if you play like we played at Austin Peav. We will stay the same as far as physical practices. It is more about attention to detail and the physicality part of the practice. We will practice the same way we did last week and you have to win the line of scrimmage."

The Gamecocks will travel to Charleston, Illinois this Saturday, Oct. 12, and will take on the Eastern Illinois University Panthers at 12 p.m

Jax State takes win from Morehead State

This past Sunday, Oct. 6, the Gamecocks hosted OVC-leader Morehead State at home in the Pete Mathews Coliseum. Jacksonville State came into this game with a 9-7 overall record, while Morehead State would come into the game with 12-4 overall record.

This matchup would be JSU's first fivematch of the season and even though the numbers did not show in their favor, the Gamecocks would not let that stop them from bringing home a win.

In the first two sets, the Gamecocks found themselves down 0-2 but they proceeded to take the win for sets two and three, forcing the game into the deciding fifth set.

After falling behind early on in the set with 8-3, the Gamecocks had three backto-back kills from Kaylee Frear, Lexie Libs and Sadie Anderson. Another big kill from Frear evened the score at 11-11. The Gamecocks then officially took their first lead at in the set with a kill from junior Kaylie Milton, bringing the score 13-12.

Jacksonville State was able to take home the win with a nail-biting score of 19-17. Overall, the match featured 35 ties and 15 lead changes with the first set having 12 ties alone.

The Gamecocks saw amazing performances from their already talented team. Milton beat her own career-high in this game with 20 successful hits in one game. Her last record was in last season's matchup against UT Martin with a total of 19 kills.

Lena Kindermann also beat her own record with 25 kills for the game and was able to bring in an incredible 26 points total against the Eagles. Anderson, who had 13 kills, and Frear, who had 10 kills, also racked in double-digit kills for the Gamecocks. Frear also broke her record of blocks in a matchup with six against the Eagles. She now holds a career high of 398 blocks total.

Lexie Libs lead the team in this match with 57 assists that lead JSU's offense for a total of 75 kills and brought in a team-high of 12 digs for the Gamecocks. Libbs' was also later named Ohio Valley Conference setter of the week for the second week in a row and for the fourth time this season.

Libs currently ranks 14th in Division I volleyball with 646 assists, and 15th with 11.14 assists-per-set. In her second, she's assisted on 1,935 kills. She is hoping to be-
