JSU student Keeley Tibbitts and other students have organized a protest to take place on the lawn of the Theron Montgomery Building (TMB) on Friday, November 1 from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. in response to the university's decision to construct a \$26 million dining facility and require commuters to pay \$275 a semester for a meal plan.

Tibbitts said the protesters will rally at Mason Hall at 12:30 p.m. where the group will then march around Trustee Circle and then protest on the lawn of the TMB from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.

"You can bring signs," said Tibbitts. "Just make sure they don't have curse words on them. Same with what you say and what you chant. We want them to listen us, so we can't be dumb college students. We have to be better than that."

Tibbitts announced via a video on the protest group on Monday, October 28 that their protest has been approved by the university. When asked, Tibbitts said that a university official agreed to sponsor their protest as a faculty advisor.

"If you are unhappy with how JSU has been using our

money and their plans to make a dining hall and mandatory meal fee for commuters, join the group 'REAL JSU Students Protest'," said Tibbitts in a Facebook post. "We are organizing a peaceful event on campus to be heard."

Tibbitts said she wants to bring more attention to the lack of student parking, building maintenance and the rising cost of attending JSU.

"People came to JSU because it was cheaper than Alabama or Auburn or anywhere else," said Tibbitts. "Now that isn't as true due to growing fees and growing tuition costs."

On Tuesday, October 22, the Board of Trustees voted to approve a 63,000-square-foot dining facility set to be constructed between Forney Avenue and Trustee Circle, where a commuter parking lot currently sits.

The resolution passed by the trustees allows the vice president of finance and administration, Jim Brigham, to negotiate an agreement with Sodexo, a food services and facility management company headquartered in France.

The trustees were provided a proposed floor plan and a rendering of the dining hall alongside a proposed mandatory commuter meal plan that would cost \$275 per semester for students who live off campus.



JACKSONVILLE HEARS REZONING ARGUMENT, DISCUSSES OFF CAMPUS CHAPTER HOUSES

The Jacksonville City Council met Monday, October 28, to hear a property rezoning request from the owners of The Roost Apartment complex.

If approved, the rezoning would allow for a new apartment complex designed to house multifamily apartments, single dwelling apartments and commercial additions, including a walking trail and taco stand or juice bar.

After the rezoning request was heard, the council addressed the planning committee, which is in the process of correcting old verbiage in the Jacksonville City Ordinance Code regarding fraternity and sorority off-campus housing.

The Planning Committee said that currently off-campus fraternity or sorority houses were not



allowed, but previously, in an earlier code, the housing was allowed.

The possibility of the Council reallowing offcampus fraternity or sorority houses has been discussed, but has yet to be voted on.

The final draft of the proposed ordinance states that "Fraternity or Sorority House, means a dwelling occupied by and maintained exclusively for college students who are affiliated with a social, honorary, or professional organization recognized by Jacksonville State University and in which meetings, socials, or other similar gatherings are held."

There are 'conditional' limits placed on the proposed houses, which means each home would require city approval.

Some of the requirements mentioned are that each bedroom could only sleep one person, but that each bedroom must also provide two parking spaces, with a minimum of six per home. Chapter houses that have the city maximum of six bedrooms must provide 12 parking spaces for their home.

Another restriction includes a mandatory fourfoot privacy fence in the front of the home with an eight to ten foot mandatory privacy fence on the sides of the property. In addition to the privacy fence, homes must also install "buffer" items to the property lines that include fast-growing cedar trees or evergreens. The items must be planted at a height of four feet with conditions that they will grow to the required height of six feet within one year.

These types of requirements are not mandatory on campus, but off-campus chapters are required to provide privacy and buffers to neighbors.



The university published a press release on Friday, October 25 detailing the proposal by Sodexo and said neither the location of the dining hall nor the \$275 mandatory commuter meal plan have been finalized.

Several students within the group have posted screenshots of their text conversations with Randall Jones, the chairman of the Board of Trustees. In those texts, Jones arranged to meet with students in the cafeteria to have lunch and address their concerns. "It's partly about getting the new contract they made cancelled, but it's also about how we want the buildings we love and need for our education to finish being rebuilt," said Tibbitts when asked why she's organizing the protest. "This spring, it'll be going on two years and Mason, the business building and the nurses building still aren't fixed." Tibbitts added that she plans to get students together to send a letter to Congressman Mike Rogers of Alabama's 3rd Congressional district. "We're getting music, nursing and business majors to state their grievances in a letter," said Tibbitts. A petition called 'Fix the old buildings first before adding a new one' was created by JSU student Hannah Robinson and has received over 1,600 signatures since its creation on Thursday, October 24 around 2:30 p.m. The petition calls for the "creation of more parking space, and to fix the buildings that have long been destroyed BEFORE the new dining hall".

News Correspondent On Tuesday, October 29, the Office of Diversity and Inclusion at Jacksonville State University hosted a "Lunch and Learn" at the Houston Cole Library to celebrate National Disability Employment Awareness Month. Free lunch was provided at the event followed by an informative presentation from the featured speaker, Patrick Daugherty with the Alabama Department of Rehabilitation. Daugherty educated participants on the issues facing disabled workers, including Resources for Employment And Disability Information Network (READI Net), the Silver Tsunami, and Retaining A Valued Employee (RAVE). As a business relations consultant for Alabama, Daugherty collaborates with businesses and individuals with disabilities through a variety of programs in order to create an efficient and fair transition from school to the workplace. One of these programs is READI Net, which offers a large variety of services and opportunities for businesses and employees with disabilities. Daugherty discussed the percentage of older workers who are trying to stay in the workforce and used the example of 30.8 million baby boomers in the workforce.

erty. "It's a pretty large number, so companies need to be prepared for what we call the Silver Tsunami. As people get older, there are going to be a lot more people with disabilities popping up in the workplace."

Daugherty went on to

the press release. "We will benchmark our food service plans with other Alabama universities and focus on getting affordable plans and value for all of our students."

The release also details plans to increase dining options around campus including the creation of an Einstein's Bagels and Boar's Head Deli in addition to expanding Jazzman's and transforming Momma Goldberg's "into a WOW Cafe with soft seating, gaming and student-centric space."

The release announced that the Student Government Association will host a town hall meeting on Wednesday, October 30 at 6 p.m. on the fifth floor of Meehan Hall to allow students to ask questions about the dining hall proposal.

Students in the protest group have voiced concerns about the university shifting attention to a new dining hall as opposed to projects like Mason Hall, the new facilities for the nursing and business schools and maintenance to existing buildings.

"The business school is not wheelchair accessible," said an anonymous JSU business student through a Snapchat text posted in the group. "There is an eleva-

"Seven out of 10 [baby boomers] plan on working after age 65," said Daughexplain the RAVE program, which can benefit a worker who develops a disability if the employer and worker mutually agree that the worker should receive accommodations in order to keep him or her in that job.

"[Vocational Rehabilitation] will come in and determine if it qualifies under RAVE" said Daugherty. "If it does, we'll bring in a counselor and an engineer to work with that person to devise an accommodation."

Daugherty ended the presentation with some facts about disability in America, stating that the earnings for people with disabilities is \$19,745 compared to \$30,285 for those without disabilities, which is a "big discrepancy in the income of people with disabilities compared to individuals without."

He also revealed that 23 percent of people with disabilities live in poverty and concluded the presentation by saying,

FIX THE OLD BUILDINGS FIRST PETITION TO POSTPONE DINING HALL RECEIVES OVER 1,700 SIGNATURES

News Correspondent A petition for Jacksonville State University to 'fix the old buildings first' has gained over 1,700 signatures.

The petition, created by Hannah Robinson, a special education major at JSU, states that the university should fix old buildings before beginning new projects.

This petition stems from the newly approved \$26 million dining hall, which was announced at a recent Board of Trustees meeting. It calls for the university to use money set aside to fix the old buildings on campus before starting new projects.

Specifically, the petition cites Mason, Merrill and Wallace Halls as buildings that need to be prioritized before a new dining hall is built. The petition also notes the lack of parking on campus, and claims that building a new facility would only take away from the already limited parking spots available to students that commute.

Robinson states that through the petition she wants the students to have a voice, and the board to actually listen to it.

Robinson said that there are a multitude of issues on campus that could be taken care of before any new projects are started, and feels that the board should prioritize the issues that actually concern students.

"If the board is going to force students to pay for something we don't actually need, the buildings that actually contribute something to our education needs to be the first priority that needs to be done before any new things are brought upon students," said Robinson.

On Tuesday, October 22, the JSU Board of Trustees met for their quarterly meeting. The board voted to renew the school's contract with Sodexo as the dining company for the university.

As part of the agreement with Sodexo, the university agreed to build a brand new \$26 million dining hall on campus that would require all commuters to purchase a \$275 meal plan.

The details of the new dining facility have not yet been finalized according to the university.

"Until a final contract is negotiated, with the help of Dr. King and Mr. Herrera, all terms are simply proposals," said Jim Brigham, JSU's vice president of finance and administration. "We will benchmark our food service plans with other Alabama universities and focus on getting affordable plans and value for all of our students."

As soon as students heard of this possible new dining facility, and the fee that would come along with it, many expressed their outrage.

Social media blew up with memes poking fun at the board's decisions, and students started forming plans to take action as well.

Two new deans will begin their tenures at Jacksonville State Univer-

tenures at Jacksonville State University in the spring semester of 2020.

Both Dr. Steven McClung, new dean for the School of Business and Industry and Dr. Tracey Matthews, new dean for the School of Health Professions and Wellness, are new to the campus.

McClung, who served as the Senior Associate Dean of the School of Business and Economics at Mercer University in Atlanta, Ga. McClung will take the place of retiring Dr. Bill Fielding who served as the dean for the School of Business and Industry for 23 years.

"I look forward to my start in January and believe that we are positioned well for a bright future at JSU," said McClung.

For eight years, McClung has overseen a 100 percent placement rate for internships and the doubling of student enrollment at Mercer University.

Prior to Mercer, McClung served as an associate professor of Integrated Marketing Communication for Florida State University. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at Marshall University and his Ph.D. at the Uni-

JAX STATE DEFEAT MURRAY STATE, HAIR RAISING GAME ENDS 14-12

The Jacksonville State football team was able to come back from a tough loss against Southeast Missouri with a win last Saturday against Murray State with a close score of 14-12. This was JSU's second game of the season being played in pouring rain, this particular game being the worst weather the Gamecocks have ever had to play in. The rain itself would test the Gamecocks ability to persevere and perform in any given circumstance.

Despite the bad weather, Jax State once again showed power in their defense. The Gamecocks were able to keep MSU from scoring for the entire first half of the game. Yul Gowdy, JSU's cornerback, led the Gamecocks defense with had a season high of 10 tackles. Defensive end DJ Coleman also contributed eight tackles for his team, being his second highest of the season right behind his nine tackles in the Gamecocks matchup against Austin Peay. The Gamecocks backup quarterback Zion Webb, who has recently returned from an injury, came into the game ready to dominate. Webb helped put the first seven points on the board at the end of the first quarter with a 45yard pass to wide-receiver Jamari Hester. This was later followed by 10-yard run by Webb at the end of the second quarter with a successful

score 14-0 going into half-time.

"It is what you expect from your backup quarterback – [Webb] has taken his role on this football team really well. When his number is called, he is ready and that is what you expect him to do," said John Grass, JSU's head coach. "I think he has adapted to what he can do with his legs and he even threw the ball well on Saturday. I hate that he got hurt and wished he could have played in the second half."

In the second half, with Webb injured on the sideline, Jax State almost lost control of the game. Not only did the Gamecocks not find an opportunity to score for the entirety of the second half, but they also gave up a safety in the fourth quarter. Along with the 2-point safety, MSU also scored a touchdown with an extra point, along with a field goal in the second half, eventually bringing the score 12-14 with the Gamecocks in barely in the lead. The Racers tried their best to turn the game around in the short three minutes left in the game and were almost successful in this attempt. In the second down at the 52-yard line, but only five seconds left in the game, the Racers went for the long field goal to try and take the game away from the Gamecocks at the very last second. This ended in a failed attempt and the

extra point from Bryant Wallace, bringing the Gamecocks were able to walk away with the win.

> "I think it was a tale of two halves with us scoring some points in the first half and just didn't get any on the board in the second half. I thought Zion Webb came in and played really well offensively and really gave us a spark in the first half. It really helped our run game some and we made some plays to get some touchdowns on the board," said John Grass, Jacksonville State's head coach. "In the second half, it was a lot of rain and I have not been in a game with that much rain in a long time. I think our guys handled the weather pretty well even though we had some turnovers."

> "Our mind is on beating UT Martin. I think

our guys understand the race and if we do our job and win this week and then we take it weekby-week. You never know what will happen," said Grass. "Our goal is to get in the playoffs and be the best team at the end of the year. We are not in control of any of that and what is sitting in front of us is what we control. It shows the parity of this league."

The Gamecocks will be traveling to Martin, Tennessee this Saturday, Nov. 2 to play UT Martin. Kick-off will begin at 2 p.m. Fans can keep up with the action on ESPN 3 or by listening to the game on the JSU Radio Network on 91.9 FM.

The Gamecocks eventually took the game back and closed out the last set with yet another kill from Kaylie Milton, taking the game with a straight-set win.

The Gamecocks saw Kaylie Milton record nine kills, Lexie Libs record 34 out of 39 assists, and Dani Steele make an impressive two of the three aces in this matchup. Meanwhile, freshman libero Erin Carmichael led the Gamecocks with 10 digs, followed by Lexie Libs with six and Maddie Cloutier, Kaylie Milton and Shayla Schmidt with four digs.

As team captain and JSU's starting setter, Libs has had a major presence on the court this season offensively. Libs has contributed well

over 800 sets for this season along with a total of 68 kills for her season record.

The Jacksonville State University men's basketball team set the tone for their upcoming season by bringing in their first win this past Tuesday, October 29, against the Montevallo Falcons with a final score of 73-68.

This game caused a roller coaster of emotions with many ups and downs for both the Gamecocks and Falcons throughout the entirety of the game.

Turnovers in this matchup almost cost the Gamecocks the win, with the Falcons scoring well over 20 points just off of turnovers alone. Jax State also saw many missed shots throughout the game, making 27 out of 56 attempted shots in the field and four out of 10 attempted shots from the three-point line.

The first half of the game was a constant back and forth, with both teams having a hard time keeping the lead. With eight minutes left, the Falcons found themselves up 18-17, and were able to keep that lead for the majority of the half with the exception of the Gamecocks tying the game twice and having a one point lead at the four-minute mark.

In the second half, missed shots would continue to haunt the Gamecocks, but the Falcons' fouls proved costly and brought home the win for Jacksonville State. The last three minutes of the game had the crowd on the edge of their seats with the score at 67-68. At this point, JSU's Mark Welsch stole the ball and made a fast break down the court to put the ball in the net bringing the score 69-68 with the Gamecocks in the lead and two minutes left in the game. Four back to back foul shots in the last couple of minutes in the game eventually sealed the win for Jacksonville State with the final score of 73-68.

Despite the many mental mistakes made on the court, there were many players that still showed out in this game that contributed to Tuesday night's win, including some new players added to the 2019-2020 roster.

Senior forward Jacara Cross was one of five Gamecocks to score in double-figures with a team high of 13 points while also contributing nine rebounds. Sophomore forward Maros Zeliznak also contributed seven points with four of those points in the field and three from the free throw line. Meanwhile, Guards Marek Welsch and Elias Harden both contributed six points in just the first minute of the game.

"We got to find a way to execute better – It started right out of the gate in the first play we didn't know what we were doing, second play we didn't know what we were doing and the first out-

Coming off of a huge win at home in the previous weekend against Murray State, the Jacksonville State University soccer team traveled to Cape Girardeau, Missouri to face off against UT Martin and conference-leading Southeast Missouri. After experiencing several setbacks throughout the season, the Gamecocks looked to close out the regular season on a high note.

The Gamecocks opened their final weekend on Friday, Oct. 25, against the first place Redhawks at Houck field on Southeast Missouri's campus. A win for JSU would keep their postseason hopes alive but unfortunately, SEMO dashed these dreams and knocked JSU out from the OVC postseason after posting two goals against the Gamecocks.

Each goal scored by SEMO came within two minutes of each other and in the first sixteen minutes of the match. SEMO's initial score came from a shot from Hailey Block in the box following an assist from the left side of the pitch. Block would then assist in the Redhawk's following goal from Jennifer Brien shortly after.

While the Redhawks stuck quickly to take the lead, the Jax State defense held off the Southeast Missouri attack for the remaining 74 minutes of the match. Already plagued with injuries throughout the season, the JSU roster experienced more losses due to several illnesses leading up to the closing weekend. The team trained with only nine players due to the limited numbers.

Statistically, Southeast Missouri controlled all 90 minutes. The Redhawks post-

ed 23 shots (13 of which were on goal), 10 corner kicks, and 13 penalties. JSU would only have one shot on goal, nine fouls, and zero corner kicks. Despite the loss, redshirt sophomore Morgan Lerch proved to be a valuable asset to the team as she held off 11 possible goals from the Redhawk offense and kept the scoring tally at bay.

Heading into the second game of the weekend, the Gamecocks hoped to cap off the season with a win against UT Martin to turn their luck around. However, Jax State would come home empty handed as UTM took the match with a score of 4-0. The lead was taken late in the first half in the 44thminute with credit to Jill Hildreath. UTM increased the score with a shot to the back of the net from Alice Adams to make it 2-0 in the 51st minute. UT Martin was then awarded a penalty in the box which resulted in a penalty kick scored by Bella Roberts. UTM finished off the game by driving home a fourth and final goal in the 78thminute from Sophia Mankowski.

As illness and injuries already took its toll on JSU's roster, fatigue set in as the team was down to twelve players against the Skyhawks. UTM led against JSU offensively as they put up 25 shots against the Gamecocks' seven. Twenty-five of the Skyhawks' shots had scoring opportunities while JSU only had four on frame.

UT Martin was also awarded more corner kicks with seven against JSU's sole set piece. The loss against the Skyhawks brings Jax State's final season record to 4-14.
