- 1. Had saved enough money to return to Decatur, Alabama and buy a grocery store.
- 2. Mrs. Terry worked from then on in the workforce. Was truly a "Rosie Riviter" (or maybe a "Rosie Burner"). Never returned to being a housewife. NOTE: Mrs. Terry also tells many stories relating to these experiences.
