Dr. John Edward McLane was born on November 29, 1934 in Washington, D.C.. His parents are Henry Earl and Lillie Ora McLane. The McLanes also had a two-year-old son, Earl, at the time of John's birth. John spent the early part of his childhood in Alexandria, Virginia, which is a suburb of Washington, D.C.. The McLane families home was near the estate of George Washington and was also close to the Potomac River. During this time in the United States, the crime rate was much lower than it is today so it was safe for John and his brother to take a bus into the city without adult supervision. The boys spent much of their time exploring the city and the bus fare was only a nickle at this time so they were able to make the trip quite often. Dr. Mclane's family remained in Alexandria until his third grade year of school.

The family moved from life in the city of Alexandria to the farm in Wagener, South Carolina. Wagener was close to John's father's birthplace and his father bought a 200 acre farm there. Although it was a major change from the city the family grew very fond of the farm life, especially during the time of World War II. Life on a farm ment rising before the sun and completing such chores as milking cows, feeding livestock, and slopping the hogs all before having breakfast and leaving for school. Dr. McLane adjusted quickly to this new lifestyle.

During the time the McLane's lived on the farm the second world war broke out and John remembered traveling to town and watching the newsreels that told of the wars progress. These news reels were the main source of many Americans because televisions had not yet been invented. John learned a lot from these newsreels, and was able to keep up with events in both Germany and Japan. Dr. McLane also recalls the rationing that took place during this war. Although the farm was very self sufficient they did trave into town for necessities like sugar, ice and clothing. They didn't suffer that much as a result of the rationing because sugar was the only thing they had to do without.

Dr. McLane and his family moved back to Alexandria, Virginia in 1947 when his father took a job that caused him to have to sell the farm. He was not happy with leaving the farm but soon re-adjusted to life in the city. He now had to ride his bike five miles to school everyday. Dr. McLane attended George Washington High School in Alexandria. Following His graduation John did not have the money to attend college so he went to work for a paint supply company and joined the Navy Reserves. Because the paint company was in Arlington, Virginia he needed a way to get to work and this was the reason for purchasing his first automobile. The car was a late modle Chevy Coupe that he bought from one of his cousins. He payed for the car with his earnings at the paint company. He kept this job throughout college and served eight years in the Naval Reserves.

While in the Reserves Dr. Mclane was required to serve one month out of the year on active duty. The had several interesting experiences while in this branch of service. For example, while serving on active duty his ship was asigned to lead a battle-ship through a channel. There was a hurricane approaching during this maneuver. The winds were so strong that they batted the ship in all directions. Suddenly the ships radar failed in very dangerous waters. It was the job of Dr. McLane and a crewmate to enter the ships radar tower and repair the equipment. This was one of his most exciting experiences while in the Navy. This was also the only time he experienced motion sickness while on board the ship.

Dr. McLane has had the privilege of meeting three United States Presidents. While in high school he was the vice-president of the student council and it was this position that allowed him to meet his first president. During his senior year of high school then Senator Richard Nixion was to give a speech to the senior class. As the classes vice-president it was Dr. McLanes job to make the Senator comfortable and to make sure he was ready to give the speech, he felt this was a great honor for such a youngman. Dr. Mclane meet his next president while attending medical school at the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. While in med-school Dr. McLane joined the U.S. Public Health Service. As a member of this group he was invited to a party

on the White House lawn by President John F. Kennedy. Dr. McLane Said, "It was quite an experience to be that close to President Kennedy". Finally He had the honor of marching with his high school band at the inaugural parade of President Dwight Eisenhower.

Dr. Mclane choose to attend George Washington University of his undergraduate studies because his brother had attended that Fortunatly/He had been an honor graduate in same university. high school and easily gained acceptance to the university. While at George Washington he majored in pre-medicine and took several theology classes as well. It was a result of those theology classes that he decided to persue a medical career. in college he read a book about the life of Albert Shwitzer, who was a famous European Doctor that went to Lamarine, Africa as a missionary. Dr. McLane attended a speech in college given by a colleague of Dr. Shwitzer, and to him this was a great honor. Dr. McLane was on the universities Pastorial Council and was asked to show a visiting councilor around the university, it was this man that persuaded him to attend medical school following his graduation from George Washington.

After graduation, Dr. McLane went to work for the lab at Georgetown university while at the same time attending the University of Virginia Medical School. Medical school was very difficultat

this time because the students were given a group of patients to care for and in addition to that care they were also responsible for all of those patients lab workings. This required students arrive early in the morning to collect samples from patients and studying those samples under the microscope in the lab on that patients floor. All this had to be done in addition to the lectures and confrences that students were required to attend. However as the later years of med-school progressed the work became both more exciting and more rewarding. It was during this training that he was able to assist in several Gyneocological surgeries and this helped steer him towards that type of practice.

Dr. McLane applied for his residency during his third year of med-school and was sent to Akron, whio to work at Case-Western Reserve Hospital. Dr. McLane and his family remained in Akron for the next five years. He left Akron after being awarded a Fellowship to study Gyneological Cancer at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. After a short stay in Atlanta he knew that this was the place he wished to continue raising his family. During his work at Emory Hospital he worked alongside Dr. Dan Thompson who was the head of the Gyneogology department for the University. At this time, 1969, they were attempting to study the causes of cervical cancers in women. As part of the study, they often had

to travel to the women's homes and persuade then to seek further treatment for their abnormalities. This was often very difficult especially for a white doctor traveling into the ghetto during the later part of the civil rights movement. However the study was a great success and in Dr. McLanes opinion helped to save the lives of many of those women. At the end of the fellowship Dr. Mclane was offered a fulltime position by Dr. Thompsom, although it was an honor to be offered the job, Dr. McLane declined the position and went into private practice at Dekalb General Hospital.

Dr. McLane has experienced many changes in the medical field during the last twenty years. Many of these changes have been in the areas of patient insurance and breakthroughs in technology. For example the cost of health care was conciderably lower in the early seventies then it is today. At that time organizations such as HMO's (Health Maintainance organization). The development of the laser also had a tremendous effect on the way many treatments were conducted. This device made long term stays in hospitals a thing of the past, once gall-bladder patiants would have to spend several days in the hospital now only have to spend the night. Dr. McLane was first introduced to laser surgery at a conference in New Orleans, upon his retun to atlanta

Dr. McLane approached the board about purchasing a laser, the board declined and he purchased his own laser and instructed many other doctors on the use of that tool. Dr. Mclane Said, "There have been tremendous advances in medicine in the last ten to twelve years".

Aside from having a forfilling medical carrer he has also enjoyed a wonderful family life. He married Ruby Lee Cowan during his second year of college and they have spent the last forty years happily married. Dr. Mclane also has two children, Lisa born in 1966 and a son, John Phillip, who he and his wife adopted in 1976. I Feel that Dr. John McLane was a great source of information and that his experiences should be shared as a part of histoy.
