Sufficiently advanced students will

younger and less advanced, will re-
ceive that care and attention so
indispensable, in laying the founda-
tion for future progress in their
studies. Those wishing to enter
the Freshman or the more ad-
vanced College Classes will receive
as speedy and thorough a prepara-
tion, as their age and respective
abilities will admit.
Exercises in composition and
declamation will be attended to
weekly. At an early period in the
session, a debating society will be
formed among the students, by at-
tendance upon which, they will ac-
quire an acquaintance with the
rules of debate, a freedom and ease
of expression, and a control of their
own minds not otherwise to be at-
tained.
Reports of the Regularity, Schol-
arship and Conduct of each student
will be made up quarterly, and
forwarded to parents and guar-
dians.
Tuition will be charged from the
time of entering to the close of the
session, and no deduction will be
made for absence except at the op-
tion of the Principal.
