### THE AFFAIR OF HONOR IN CHARLESTON.

The Charleston papers published the following correspondence which took place between the parties of this unfortunate affair. The undersigned deem it their duty to lay before the community, through the press of the city, with a view to a just understanding of the late hostile difficulties between Mr. Edward Magrath and Mr. William R. Taber, Jr., the following correspondence and statement.

The annexed communication was handed to Mr. Taber on Sunday afternoon, the 27th inst., Mr. James Conner, who bore it, not having met him the day previous.

To John Hart, Esq., and W. R. Taber, Jr., Esq., Editors Charleston Mercury.

GENTLEMEN:—You have, after repeated threats and with deliberation, published and circulated insulting and libellous attacks upon my brother Judge Magrath.

The annexed communication was handed to Mr. Taber on Sunday afternoon, the 27th inst., Mr. James Conner, who bore it, not having met him the day previous.

You have done this without provocation or the excuse of excitement, and in the face of relations with Judge Magrath, proving upon both of you personal estimates of him in private exactly the reverse of those you have endorsed and published.

It is nearly certain—indeed, as certain as anything that I know, that in all deaths the physical suffering is small. Even where invalids experience the most excruciating agony during the progress of the disease, nature comes to her relief at the last hour, and life goes out gently, like a candle in its stick.

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### PHYSICAL PAIN OF DEATH.

A paragraph going through the columns of the papers gives the opinion of Lord Bacon and others, that the pain of hanging is insupportable. This is asserted, for example, that after a momentary feeling of suffocation, bright colors dance before the eyes and stretch away into vistas of indescribable loveliness. There is no reason to doubt the truth of this declaration, because numerous instances have occurred of persons being cut down before life was extinct; and it was on the authority of well-authenticated examples of this character, that Lord Bacon and others founded their opinion.

Moreover, hanging, in its effect on the human organism, produces results very similar to those produced by some natural diseases, so that this also affords a criterion for judging. In cases of drowning, like the testimony is universal that the physical pain of the patient is insupportable.

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### THE AFFAIR OF HONOR IN CHARLESTON.

Mr. Edward Magrath disclaims in his note of challenge to Mr. Taber, he disclaimed to use offensive and derogatory language to him.

Mr. Conner assented to their adoption of the following words by editorial addition. "That Mr. Taber, by his publication of these articles is personal." Also Mr. Magrath regrets anything in the article that is offensive.

Col. Cunningham declined the additional requisition upon Mr. Taber, whereupon a third exchange of shots ensued. Mr. Taber fell, mortally wounded in the upper part of the head.

Mr. Magrath addressed a similar communication to Mr. Hart, who returned the following reply.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 27, 1856.

Sir: I acknowledge the receipt of your note of the 26th inst. by the hands of Mr. Conner. Accordingly this, you will receive a note from Mr. Taber, to which I refer you as my answer.

Your obedient servant, JOHN HEART.

Mr. Hart, accompanied by his friend, at the time agreed upon, appeared upon the ground, and after the fall of Mr. Taber, Mr. S. Cunningham, the acting second of Mr. Hart, notified Mr. Conner of his presence, and his readiness to answer the demand of E. Magrath, Esq., for satisfaction; whereupon Mr. Conner replied that they had no further demand to make. Mr. Conner then in company with his principal, retired from the field.

### THE PORT HOPE TRAGEDY.

We hear by gentlemen who came over in the steamer from Port Hope last night, that the coroner's jury in the case of Henderson, who was shot by Brogden, returned a verdict justifying the murderer.

The jury consisted of fifteen prominent citizens of Port Hope, sixteen of whom signed the verdict. It declares that Henderson died by the hand of Brogden; and further, that the act was justifiable and necessary to restrain the growing spirit of licentiousness in society. Our informant thinks the murder as well as the verdict is generally approved by the people of Port Hope. What legal steps will be taken against Brogden we do not know.

We have heard something further in reference to the provocation to the crime, which increases the enormity of Henderson's offence. It is said that he studied law in the same office with Brogden, and that they were mutual friends. Brogden married an attractive young lady, named Honour, daughter of a British half-pay officer, since deceased. Mrs. B. had a sister residing with her, to whom Henderson paid some attention. He was a constant and welcome visitor at the house of Brogden, and enjoyed all
