**INAUGURAL ADDRESS,
OF
PRESIDENT BUCHANAN,
MARCH 4, 1857.**

FELLOW-CITIZENS: I appear before you
this day to take the solemn oath that I
will faithfully execute the office of Presi-
dent of the United States, and will, to the
best of my ability, preserve, protect and
defend the constitution of the United
States.

In entering upon this great office, I must
humbly invoke the God of our fathers for
wisdom and firmness to execute its high
and responsible duties in such a manner as
to restore harmony and ancient friendship
among the people of the several States, and
to preserve our free institutions through-
out many generations. I am convinced that
our country, in the inherent love for the
Constitution and the Union which still
animates the hearts of the American peo-
ple, let me earnestly ask their powerful
support in sustaining all just measures
calculated to perpetuate these, the richest
political blessings which Heaven has ever
bestowed upon any nation. Having
been called to the honor of the Presidency,
I shall be most anxious to follow the
example of our fathers in administering the
government except the disinterestedly and
faithfully to serve my country, and to live in
the grateful memory of my countrymen.

We have recently passed through a Presi-
dential contest in which the passions of
our fellow-citizens were excited to the
highest degree by questions of deep and vital
importance; but when the people pre-
sented to the nation, with the temper of
their will, the temper of our substance,
and all was calm.

The voice of the majority, speaking in
the manner prescribed by the constitution,
was heard, and in accordance with the
provisions of the constitution, the
most perfect form of government and
Union ever devised by man will not suffer
to perish until it shall have been suc-
cessfully instrumental, by its example, in
the extension of civil and religious liberty
throughout the world.

Next in importance to the maintenance
of the constitution and the preservation
of the Union, is the maintenance of the
public virtue of the government, of cor-
ruption. Public virtue is the vital spirit of
republics and history proves that when this
has decayed, and the love of my country
has departed for a season, the
substance has departed forever.

Our present financial condition is with-
out parallel in our history. It is a
surplus in its treasury. This surplus
necessarily gives birth to extravagant
legislation. It produces wild schemes of
speculation and begets a race of speculators
and jobbers, whose ingenuity is devoted to
contriving and promoting expedients to ob-
tain public money. The purity of official
conduct, whether rightly or wrongly in-
spected, and the character of the govern-
ment suffers in the estimation of the
people. This is in itself a very great evil.

The natural mode of relief from the em-
barrassment is to appropriate the surplus
in the treasury to great national objects,
for which a clear warrant can be found in
the constitution. Among these I might
mention the extinguishment of the public
debt, a reasonable increase of the navy,
which is at present inadequate to the pro-
tection of our vast coasting and new terri-
tory, and the maintenance of our
frontiers. It is not necessary to resort to
the expedient of a modification of the
tariff, and this has, I trust, been
accomplished in such a manner as to do
little injury as may have been practicable
to our domestic manufactures, especially
those necessary for the defence of the
country. Any discrimination against
foreign manufactures, for the purpose of
protecting favored corporations, individuals,
or interests, would have been unjust to
the rest of the community and inconsis-
tent with that spirit of fairness and equality
which ought to govern in the adjustment
of a revenue tariff.

But the squandering of the public money
into comparative insignificance a
temptation to corruption, which is a
very great evil. To such a point it
is necessary to resort to a modification
of the tariff, and this has, I trust, been
accomplished in such a manner as to do
little injury as may have been practicable
to our domestic manufactures, especially
those necessary for the defence of the
country. Any discrimination against
foreign manufactures, for the purpose of
protecting favored corporations, individuals,
or interests, would have been unjust to
the rest of the community and inconsis-
tent with that spirit of fairness and equality
which ought to govern in the adjustment
of a revenue tariff.

The Federal constitution is a grant from
the States to Congress of certain specific
powers, and the question whether the
grant should be liberally or strictly
construed, has, more than any other
point in the legislation.—Whether
in the construction of the constitution,
that long experience and observation
have convinced me that a strict construc-
tion of the powers of the government is
only true, as well as the only safe, theory
of the constitution. Whenever, in our
history, doubtful questions have arisen
concerning the powers of the government,
these have never failed to be
settled by the Supreme Court, and
many such instances might be
cited, if it were the proper occasion.
Neither is it necessary for the public
good, because all the great and useful
operations of the government, both in
peace and in war, have been conducted
in strict conformity with the letter and
spirit of the constitution.

It is an evil omen of the times that men
have undertaken to calculate the mere
material value of the Union. Reasoned
estimates have been presented of the pecuni-
ary profits and local advantages which
would result to different States and sections
in its dissolution, and of the compensa-
tion to be made to each State and section
in its dissolution. It is possible to add to
this list of material value, the loss of
the Union, and the loss of our Pacific
possessions, except by means of a military
road through the

Territories of the United States, over which
men and munitions of war may be speedily
transported from the Atlantic States to
the Pacific coast, and to repel the invader? In
the event of a war with a great power, such
as France, because such a power would
necessarily close the route across the isthmus
of Central America. It is impossible to
conceive that, whilst the constitution has
expressly required Congress to defend all
the States, it should yet deny to them, by
means of which one of these States can be
defended. Besides, the government, ever
since its origin has been in the constant
practice of constructing military roads.
It might also be wise to consider whether
the love for the Union which now animates
our fellow-citizens of the Pacific coast may
not be impaired by our neglect or refusal
to provide for them, in their remote and
isolated condition, the only means by
which the power of the States, on this side
of the Rocky Mountains, can reach them
in sufficient time to "protect" them "against
invasion." I forbear for the present from
expressing an opinion as to the wisest and
most economical mode in which the govern-
ment can best be able in accomplishing
this great and necessary work. I believe
that many of the difficulties in the way,
which now appear formidable, will in a
great degree, vanish as soon as the nearest
and best route shall have been satisfac-
torily ascertained.

It may be proper that, on this occasion,
I should make some brief remarks in re-
ference to our rights and duties as a member
of the great family of nations. In our
intercourse with them there are some prin-
ciples approved by all nations, and
from which we should never depart.
We ought to cultivate peace, commerce,
and friendship with all nations; and this
not merely as the best means of promoting
our own material interests but in a spirit
of Christian benevolence towards our
fellow-men, wherever their lot may be cast.
Our diplomacy should be direct and frank,
neither seeking to obtain more nor ac-
cepting less than is our due. We ought to
cherish a sacred regard for the rights and
interests of all nations, and never attempt to
interfere in the domestic concerns of any,
unless this shall be imperatively required
by the great law of self-preservation. To
avoid arranging alliances has been a max-
im of our policy ever since the days of
Washington, and his wisdom no one will
struggle to dispute. In short, we ought to
be just, in a kindly spirit, to all nations,
and require justice from them in return.
It is our glory that, whilst other nations
have extended their dominions by the
sword, we have never acquired any terri-
tory except by fair purchase, or as in the
case of Texas, by the voluntary determina-
tion of the people of that territory to
people to bread their destinies with our
own. Even our acquisition of Mexico
from France, in 1848, was a purchase, and
the purchase of the territory of Oregon, in
1846, was a purchase of the territory of
