FROM FLORIDA.
TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 30.—The Legislature of the State of Florida has today unanimously passed the bill calling a convention of the people of Florida, to be held on the 30th day of January, 1861.

FROM LOUISIANA.
NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 29.—To-day Thanksgiving day, was properly observed here. There were services in the churches. Rev. Dr. Palmer, of the Presbyterian Church (and formerly of the South Carolina) preached before an immense congregation. His discourse was eloquent, thrilling, and strongly in favor of secession.

FROM VIRGINIA.
PETERSBURG, Va., Nov. 30.—The largest meeting ever convened in this place was held last night. It was called by the friends of the Federal Union.

FROM GEORGIA.
AUGUSTA, Nov. 30.—There is a great demonstration here this place this afternoon, in honor of the suspension of the inter-State flag across the Savannah river. The flag bears the arms of Georgia and South Carolina, with appropriate mottoes about three thousand persons are present.

FROM WASHINGTON.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—It is now certain that Secretary Cobb is resigning. He will leave the Cabinet to-day, feeling that the Southern members solicited him to remain, and to go at the same time with the Southern members of Congress, who, it is confidently expected, will be re-elected.

MOVEMENTS IN TENNESSEE.
MEMPHIS, Tenn., Dec. 1.—There was a large and enthusiastic assemblage of the citizens here last night. They passed resolutions to accept the irrepressible conflict, and calling upon the Governor to convene the Legislature and a State Convention.

NEW YORK MATTERS.
NEW YORK, November 30.—The Government has not paid the Custom officials their salaries to-day, which has occasioned some alarm among the employees of Uncle Sam.

THE PRESIDENT AND SOUTH CAROLINA.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—The President hopes that South Carolina will appreciate the decency of his position, and not force the collection of the duties by the Federal Government.
