Fiendish Conduct

On last Tuesday evening, the 29th inst., Mr. Wade B. Neely of this county, being out upon his farm near his residence was fired upon by a number of deserters receiving a severe wound in his left thigh. After which they entered the house, insulted the family, abused the servants, appropriated what things they desired, destroyed some others and then retired to the roadside and concealed themselves there to prevent the physicians visiting the wounded man. Information of this outrage having reached our village, a small party started out to relieve the family and guard the Doctor through. We proceeded to within a half a mile of Mr. Neely's where they were in ambush and fired into us, wounding one man in the neck. Two of our men were thrown from their horses but made their escape. THE FIGHT AT CHARLESTOWN.—From a gentleman just from Western Virginia the Richmond Examiner gets some interesting particulars of the attack on Charlestown by General Imboden—in fact the first authentic account we have had of the affair. Week before last General Imboden conceived the idea of a movement on Charlestown with a view of surprising and capturing the garrison, stores, supplies, &c. Accordingly, all being ready he started out from Berryville for Charlestown with his command of what number it is not prudent to say on the morning of Tuesday the 18th, about two o'clock. After a march of some four hours about seven o'clock in the morning Charlestown was reached whereupon a halt was ordered and a flag of truce sent in order to charge of Capt. McNeil demanding the surrender of the garrison...

The enemy's position and confidence no doubt was strongly barricaded. The derelict house and jail had been converted into temporary forts, and their walls had been pierced by port holes. The jail was held by them as a venerable spot, for it was the one in which old Brown was confined; and they declared that it should never be taken, at the same time adding further defiance by singing and shouting that famous abolition melody, "Old John Brown's bones lie mouldering in the grave," &c. On hearing that the enemy refused to surrender, General Imboden immediately ordered fire to be opened upon the town, directing it principally against the court house and jail. The fire soon became hot for the enemy, and he was quickly driven from his places of shelter and rapidly retreated from the town. In his flight he was closely pursued by our cavalry. Major White's battalion leading in the charge. We succeeded in taking 400 prisoners with all their arms and equipments, and five wagons loaded with commissary and medical stores and supplies.

NEWS FROM THE FRONT.—Information of a reliable character has been received by the Quartermaster in this city, that our forces now occupy Knoxville, Tenn; the enemy having retreated to Cumberland Gap. Our main force is still at London and Campbells station, but our cavalry, it seems, entered Knoxville a few days since. This movement it is hoped, will relieve the pressure upon Bragg and prevent a further retreat on Georgia. Col. Sun. 7th.

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Obituary

JAMES V. WILLIAMS was born on the 7th day of Nov. 1819, in Abbeville Dis. S. C., and departed this life, after a severe illness, on the 12th of April last, in the 44th year of his age. His father, James T. Williams, removed to Ala. and settled near White Plains, where James V. Williams was raised. From a child he was remarkable for kindheartedness and generosity, and for a quiet, modest disposition, and for a number of years in an unusual degree the amiable traits of character which distinguished his youth, and by which he secured the confidence and won the esteem and affection of all who knew him. A spirit of integrity and uprightness distinguished him in all the relations of life and especially so in his business transactions. He was a friend to the poor, a generous sympathizer with the suffering wherever it was needed, and was called by an open purse to a variety of benevolent occasions. As a neighbor he was kind and obliging; as a friend, true and faithful; as a husband and a father, tender and affectionate; as a Christian, sincere and earnest; but modest and retiring. In a life so full of duties and so full of spirit, that few and those only who knew him most intimately, understood and valued him as he truly was. In 1842, Mr. Williams married Peticular J. Winn, the second daughter of the Rev. General Winn, formerly of this State. His death leaves her a widow with eight young children, in

JACKSONVILLE, ALA. November 21, 1863.

A letter from Mr. E. T. Read one of our Representatives, dated 10th inst., informs us that up to that time legislation had been impeded by the elections which were their nearly through. J. H. Caldwell, Esq. was re-elected solicitor of this circuit. There were some six candidates mentioned for Confederate States Senator, but it is probable Mr. Curry or Mr. Clay would be elected. Bills were before the house to abolish the office of School Superintendent, and to provide for the support of indigent families of soldiers, and other bills of more or less importance.

We copy from the report made extensively for the Montgomery Advertiser that portion only of the proceedings of the Legislature of a public character and general interest. It would be of no interest or benefit to our readers, to publish the bills introduced of a local and private nature.

Prisoners. It is now pretty well understood, says the Richmond Whig, that the cartel has been dropped and so more prisoners are to be exchanged during the war. The fact is suggestive. Our soldiers will remember that capture means imprisonment till the close of the war, or perhaps for life. They will remember also that Yankee prisoners have to be fed, and that every one sent to Richmond shortens their rations and increases the price of food purchased by their wives and children. We are bound by every obligation of humanity to treat our prisoners well and the Government will continue to feed them with the best it can afford, even when the price of provisions becomes so enormous that the wives and children of the soldiers will have to be supported by public charity. But what soldier will like to see his own flesh and blood turned into panthers for the sake of pampering Yankees? The more Yankees sent to Richmond, the sooner will our women and children be compelled to beg their daily bread. We don't blame the Yankee Government for its course; everything is fair in war, but we repeat, the fact that no more prisoners are to be exchanged is very suggestive, especially to Southern soldiers, who do not like long years of confinement, and who have families not accustomed to the pangs of hunger or the hardships and ignominy of the poor house.

Regular Session. SENATE. TUESDAY, NOV. 10. The Senate met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Baldwin. BILLS INTRODUCED. Harrison, a bill to repeal the Law, passed Dec. 10, 1861. Referred. Powell presented a petition from certain citizens of Alabama, praying for relief against extortioners. Referred. Hill presented a petition which referred to the Committee on Roads, Bridges and Ferries. Senate adjourned until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

HOUSE REPRESENTATIVES. TUESDAY, NOV. 10, 1863. House met at pursuant to adjournment. BILLS INTRODUCED. By Mr. Ellis, a bill to prevent the depreciation of the currency. Referred. By Mr. Parker, of Coosa, a bill to protect the citizens of the State. Ordered to a second reading. By Mr. Woodville, a bill to increase the pay of judges of this State. (Increase \$1 per day.) Referred. By Mr. Taylor, a bill in relation to debts. Referred. Sundry resolutions of enquiry and instructions were offered and adopted. House adjourned till tomorrow morning.

SENATE. WEDNESDAY, NOV. 11th '63. Senate met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Jordan. Mr. Lewis introduced a bill to authorize executors, guardians etc; to receive Confederate notes in Payment of debts. Referred. The President appointed Messrs. Davis, Harrison and Dixon a special committee to act with a like committee from the House with reference to the action of the Virginia Legislature. Senate adjourned till 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. WEDNESDAY, NOV. 11, 1863. House met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Rev. J. C. Davis of the Protestant Church of this city. BILLS INTRODUCED. By Mr. Chambers, to amend the Revenue laws. Referred. A bill to prevent illicit trading with slaves. Referred. By Mr. Cooper, amendatory of the 13th Section of an act to regulate judicial proceedings. Referred. Also to prevent gaming. Referred. By Mr. Vansandt, a bill to amend an act to prevent false representations as government agencies. Referred. By Mr. Clarke, joint Resolution in relation to soldiers' pay. Adopted. By Mr. Menasco, to increase the fees of Probate Judges, sheriffs and county clerks. Referred.

REPORT FROM STANDING COMMITTEES. From Judiciary.—Mr. Chapman reported favorably to the bill to authorize ejectments. Ordered to a third reading. From Finance.—Mr. Bonners reported adversely to the bill to amend section 1,632 of the Code. Concurred in. By Mr. Taylor, to exempt one slave from levy and sale under execution.—Referred. From North Georgia and Tennessee.—Major Long, of East Tennessee, was arrested by Burnside, and condemned to be hung. It was alleged that he was recruiting within the Federal lines, when Col. Clift was captured, he was thus engaged in this business. Gen. Bragg at once dispatched a messenger to Burnside, with the assurance that if Major Long was hung Clift would suffer the same fate. While Col. Clift was under this sentence, his son, one of the bravest men in the Southern army, visited him. The father bowed his head in sorrow and shame, and uttered not a word; the son, however, stated that his father had been separated from him; and that he could only bid adieu and ask God to pardon his betrayal of his State. The answer of Burnside to the demand of Bragg was that he had not heard of Long. The inference is that Long has already been executed, and it is probable that Colonel Clift is doomed.

REVIVAL IN THE ARMY.—Rev. T. Lacy commissioner to the 2d and 3d corps in the army of Virginia, makes the following encouraging remarks: Since I last wrote, there has been a great and blessed work of grace in progress in the 2d and 3d corps. Not far from one thousand have professed faith in Christ within the last month. And there are twice that number seeking the way of salvation. Rev. Mr. Lewis, writing from a convalescent hospital of the same corps, says: There is a deep and wide-spread influence here. The half has not been told in the religious newspaper. Many are afraid to witness their faith, lest it be thought wild and extravagant.

Late News.

Special to the Intelligencer from 1863. MISISSIPPI RIFLES, Nov. 7.—Lookout battery yesterday shelled the enemy's troops and a large wagon train which crossed Brown's Ferry, doing considerable damage. The enemy has gradually increasing their fortifications, and have created a work east of the Star Fort. In fight to-day we shelled the enemy's troops and battery across the river. Weather cool, but pleasant.

Latest from the Front. MISISSIPPI RIFLES, Nov. 9.—Lookout battery shelled the enemy's wagon train heavily this morning. Moccasin battery replied for the first time in three days. Yesterday the cavalry of Gen. Sam. Jones' command, after a sharp skirmish at Rogersville, thirty-five miles East of Knoxville, captured 800 prisoners, 1,000 animals, destroying a number of wagons of supplies. Intelligence from the Yankee lines states that Thomas has been reinforced with 40,000 men, and intends to dig inch by inch until he gets possession of Lookout, the river and the railroad; to obtain supplies. He intends wintering in Chattanooga. 290.

Special dispatch to the Montgomery Advertiser. MISISSIPPI RIFLES, Nov. 13.—There has been occasional firing to-day. The Yankee Captains from Virginia and another from Illinois deserted yesterday, and report that Grant expects soon to make an assault on Lookout. Their army is in full retreat. All is serene.

THE SIEGE OF CHARLESTON. ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-THIRD DAY. The enemy's bombardment grows more and more languid in spirit. Gregg fired on Tuesday, at intervals of half an hour, until the monitors assaulted the fort for the space of two hours, throwing, perhaps twenty-five or thirty shells. We are unable, however, to give to-day an accurate report of the number of shots. Our batteries continued to direct their fire against Gregg, and it is believed, notwithstanding the ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FOURTH DAY. The enemy's fire of late has somewhat changed his system of attack, pushing his bombardment of Sumter more severely during the night than the day. Mortar shelling by night was first resorted to on Monday night. On that night, also, the number of trilled shots was greater than on any preceding night. One hundred and eighty-two mortar shells were fired, of which fifty missed and one hundred and fifty-four filled shots, of which sixty-two missed. The enemy has to a great extent ceased using his heavier guns; most of his rifled shells being fired from lighter pieces than he has hitherto employed. We are therefore probably justified in inferring that his heavy guns have been endangered by the late strain upon them, and perhaps, that his stock of heavy ammunition has been considerably reduced. We have to report of the number of shots for the last two days. On Tuesday night the fire was rather severe, but grew languid on Wednesday. Gregg only firing at intervals of from fifteen to twenty minutes. On Monday he bombarded the fort from nine o'clock to two p. m. The only casualty which has reached us is that private M. M. Brown, Co. C, 25th S. C. V., was slightly wounded, on Monday night, in the foot and ankle. Mercury.
