OBITUARY

Died, at the residence of his uncle, Washington Williams, in Calhoun county, Alabama, on the 14th day of February, 1864, Eugene O. Williams, fourth son of James A. and Coriella Williams, in the 27th year of his age. In the Spring of 1858, Eugene removed to Calhoun county, Ala. with his father, to Cadiz Parish, Louisiana, where he remained until the commencement of the present war, when he came back to his native State, and with a soul fired with the spirit of patriotism, in April, 1861, he entered the army of the Confederate States, as a volunteer in Captain D. P. Turner's company, 120th Reg't Ala. V. I. then at Fort Mifflin, Pa. After serving twelve months he re-enlisted with the same company in the 3rd Ala. Cavalry, and went to Middle Tennessee. He was captured by the enemy at Shelbyville, in June 1863. After months of suffering in prison, in the enemy's hand he was exchanged, but his constitution soon yielded to disease, and he sank rapidly to a soldier's grave. Many acquaintances, friends and relatives will long cherish a manly and affectionate remembrance of his presence, noble and generous disposition, and up-right and honorable conduct.

JOHN A. BOWMAN, a native of Knox Co., Tenn., removed to Alabama in the Winter of 1851. When President Davis called on Alabama through her Governor for her quota of volunteers, Mr. B. laid down every thing at home, and entered the army as a volunteer in the 20th Reg't, which was organized in Talladega. This Regiment done considerable service in the Army of the South, in which service he was an active soldier. He was with the Regiment at Baker's creek, in and around Vicksburg, where he contracted chronic diarrhoea. With great difficulty he arrived at his home in Cross Plains, and after a long continued illness died on the 28th Sept., 1864. He was truly a man of kind and obliging disposition. He now fills a soldier's grave, let his epitaph be "he died in the service of his country." Peace to his remains. G. L. A.

ROXBORO, May 30.

It is reported that Butler's forces are leaving Bermuda Hundred under the protection of gunboats.

Our troops at 3 o'clock to-day were reported in line of battle in front of Atter's Station, on the Virginia Central Railroad. Perhaps a collision may occur to-morrow, none has taken place to-day.

The enemy have left Hanover Court-house.

The army correspondent of the New York World is reported captured to-day, with papers on his person, showing the loss in the 6th (Sedgwick's) co. since the campaign began, at 18,000, or three-fifths of what it started with.

Papers found on the correspondent also say Grant does not mean to fight any more as he has been superseded. Hereafter he will rely on entrenched positions. Hampton to-day was placed temporarily in command of the cavalry of this army.

HEADQUARTERS CAMP OF INSTRUCTION, TALLADEGA, ALA., April 27th 1864. GENERAL ORDERS, No. 18.

I. It being continually represented by men, on their arrival at this Camp, that they are sent forward by Enrolling officers, under an assurance of obtaining "furloughs," the following extract from an order issued from this Camp, on the 11th of September, 1862, and still in force, is published for the information of all concerned: "Enrolling officers will caution all persons sent to camp to come prepared to remain as no lack of preparation will be considered a valid reason for granting furloughs."

A strict observance of this regulation is enjoined; and Enrolling officers will see as far as practicable, that all persons sent up by them are properly prepared, with clothing and such other requisites as may be obtained, for immediate service.

II. Recruits will not be ordered to camp without examination by the Medical Boards of their respective Districts.

III. Recruits will not be sent under guard, unless for some offense alleged against them, with reasonable presumption of truth; and every precaution will be adopted to correct the vulgar fallacy, that enrollment, under the Conscription laws, by the properly authorized officers, implies anything creditable to the persons enrolled, or that it partakes in any degree of the character of an "arrest."

Late News.

Special Dispatch from Ora. ALABAMA, via Atlanta, May 24.

McPherson's corps crossed the Etowah Friday night, at Gillan's Bridge, three miles south of Kingston, fortifying both sides of the river, and moving in the direction of Dallas, 35 miles northwest of Atlanta. A sufficient force has marched to intercept them.

Heavy firing was heard to-day at noon in that direction.

Gen. Wheeler went on a scout to Cassville, Sunday night, Hooker's corps was still there.

The enemy burnt the iron works and flour mill on the Etowah Sunday night.

Wheeler captured the Guard of Cartersville the same night.

On Saturday our cavalry skirmished heavily with the enemy.

Hood's corps is at the Etowah, the Railroad bridge being reconstructed.

All the train were sent south of the Chattahoochee as a precautionary measure.

A battle is anticipated between Dallas and Powder Spring.

The confidence and enthusiasm of the army unabated.

THE VICTORY IN THE VALLEY OF VIRGINIA.—Gen. Breckenridge's victory over Seigel, on Sunday, is said to have been complete. He is reported to have captured six pieces of artillery and between three and four hundred prisoners.

Nothing saved the enemy from total rout but their flying precipitately across the Shenandoah river, and burning the bridge behind them.

Our losses are reported at three hundred. We have heard no estimate of the Yankee loss, though it must have been very heavy.—Lynchburg Virginia.

SPOTTSYLVANIA, C. H., May 14.

There was only slight infantry skirmishing to-day with occasional discharges of artillery.

Grant shows no sign of falling back. Scouts report that he is receiving no reinforcements, though prisoners say that he is expecting Schoenck with troops from Baltimore and other places.

It is believed that Heintzelman with troops from the fortifications at Washington was with Grant in the fight of Thursday.

Johnston's division in the fight of Thursday, lost about 2,000 prisoners and 16 pieces of artillery, principally from Page's and Krenshaw's brigades.

Grant's dead in our front are still unburied.

The enemy are busy all day in shifting from point to point, and maneuvering generally.

Gen. Daniel of North Carolina, wounded in the fight of Thursday died to-day. Gen. Ramsauer, was slightly wounded.

There were about 1,500 prisoners captured during these fights.

Grant's losses since the opening of the campaign, are put down at fifty thousand and at the lowest figures. Our losses in killed and wounded and missing in the same time, are not over 15,000.

Fredricksburg is said to be garrisoned by negro troops.

Lt. Gen. A. P. Hill, resumed command of his troops to-day.

Our troops have been marching and fighting and lying in line of battle 12 days, but to day their spirits are fine, and the resolution invincible.

The troops are receiving adequate rations, and the animals a sufficiency of forage.

ATLANTA, May 27.

Johnston advanced and came up with the enemy at New Hope, four miles east of Dallas, at noon on Wednesday.

Hood's corps was the first in the fight. Part of Stevenson's and Hindman's were engaged.

We had only one line of battle.

The enemy charged and was handsomely repulsed.

A private note from Johnston's headquarters yesterday says the affair on Wednesday was handsome. We are having a renewal this morning. During the day firing continues and is evidently receiving from us. A few guns were heard this morning at still greater distance.

Gen. Cummings was severely wounded in the breast and arm.—Gen. Reynolds slightly.

Our army was moving up to the field yesterday morning in fine condition.

ASHLAND, May 17.

Our army is moving rapidly in a line almost parallel with the route which Grant is following.

At 2 o'clock a heavy force of the enemy had appeared at Hanover Courthouse and were pressing our cavalry back at that point.

Two prisoners just brought in belonging to the Sixth corps say their command received orders to march to the White House.

RICHMOND, May 27.

Official information received says the advance of Grant's left is crossing the Pamunky at Hanover Town, this morning, moving in this direction.

The Senate unanimously concurred in a joint resolution from the House declaring that in no event will this Government consent to division or dismemberment of the State of Virginia, but will maintain her jurisdiction, sovereignty, and the limits of her ancient boundary at any and every cost.

Skirmishing commenced at daylight and heavy fighting during the day, but no general engagement as yet. The enemy feeling our position, was repulsed with heavy loss. We captured many prisoners.

FROM GEORGIA.

Gen. Cleburne Repulsed the 4th Army Corps.—Yankee Loss Between 7,000 & 8,000.—Ours only 5,000.—Assault on Stevenson's Division Repulsed.—The Enemy's Left Giving Way.—Our Troops Advantageous for a General Engagement.—From the Trans-Mississippi.—Further Particulars of the Late Battles.—Very Late Northern News.

New Hope via Marietta, May 28.

The enemy are massed in our front on the south side of Pumpkin Vine Creek.

Very heavy artillery and musketry skirmishing yesterday from sunrise till dark, principally on the right wing when it ceased, and was resumed about midnight. We captured between two and three hundred prisoners, among them Lieut. Col. Fambllis of the 59th Ohio, Adj. Haller and three Lieutenants. Our forces are inspired with the greatest confidence in the defeat of the enemy.

Every man is anxious engagement to take place, which will probably be to-day.

Skirmishing is now going on, on the right of the right centre.

Lieut. Col. Fambllis reports Gen. Wallack severely wounded at Resaca.

BATTLEFIELD, 8 MILES FROM MARIETTA, May 28.

Heavy skirmishing began at daylight yesterday morning on the left and continued without intermission, to about 5 o'clock, when a desperate assault was made upon Stevenson's division, which was repulsed handsomely with heavy loss to the enemy. This is the fourth assault that has been made upon this point resulting in heavy loss to the enemy. A battery was run up within two hundred yards of Stewart's line and opened a terrific fire. Our sharpshooters killed every gunner and horse in the battery thus hastily abandoned. Last night at 2 o'clock the enemy advanced on the extreme right and were ambuscaded by Claourne who followed with a charge which routed the enemy completely, leaving 149 prisoners, including their brigade commander, together with their dead and wounded in our hands.

The enemy's loss in the affair was between 5 and 6 thousand. Our loss was about six hundred.

The conduct of Granbury's brigade is highly spoken of. Granbury received a slight wound, but is still in the field. Brisk skirmishing began this morning and still continues. The extreme left of the enemy are massing on the left this morning. Heavy firing continued up to 11 o'clock.

New Hope, May 28. via Marietta, May 28.

Gen. Cleburne's division engaged the 4th Army Corps, under Howard, about 1 o'clock this morning, and after a desperate contest signally repulsed it with a loss of between five and seven thousand. We captured between one hundred and fifty to two hundred prisoners, exclusive of the wounded, immense quantities of arms and accoutrements.

Gen. Cleburne says the enemy's dead are piled thicker than he ever saw them before. Between five hundred and one thousand dead were left close up to his front.

Their line of breastworks in front of Loring's command was abandoned. Our loss will probably number four or five hundred. Skirmishing still going on. The enemy's left is gradually giving way.

HOUSTON, TEXAS, May 13.

Since April 8th, we have whipped two Yankee armies—one in Louisiana, the other in Arkansas, driving the latter to Little Rock and surrounding the former in Alexandria, capturing in all thirty four pieces of artillery, eight thousand stand of small arms, 10,000 prisoners, 1,000 wagons, 2 gunboats, and 5 transports, killing and wounding fully 8,000 Yankees. Our total loss in killed, wounded and missing about 4,000. At present Steele is in Little Rock with the wreck of 15,000 troops threatened by Price.

The Yankee Gen. Thayer with Bank's army 20,000 strong is in Alexandria. Porter's fleet is detained above by low water.

We have possession of Red River above and below, and heavy forces on each side.

Col. Griffin with a force of two hundred sharpshooters and a battery of artillery, surprised two gunboats.

The Granite City and the iron-plated Wave, passed down the river on May the 6th. We captured both.

RICHMOND, May 28.

The World and Journal of Commerce were suppressed for publishing a bogus proclamation from Lincoln calling for four hundred thousand more recruits, and appointing a day of fasting and prayer. The Editors offer a large reward for the perpetrators of the hoax.

Hoddy's cavalry attacked the enemy five hundred strong, at Madison Station on the M & C R., capturing 87 prisoners; all of their commissary and quartermaster's stores, and the telegraph instrument.—News Okema, 24th.

Further Particulars of the Repulse of the Enemy on Friday—Gallantry of Texas and Arkansas Troops.—Maj. Gen. Howard Jackson and Brig. Gen. King Wounded.—Hancock's Wright and Burnside's Forces Cross the Pamunky.

New Hope, May 28.

Granbury's brigade was placed in action at 5 P. M. yesterday to arrest the enemy's attempt to turn our right flank. We had no defence except a few boulders and stones hastily collected by the cavalry which held the position, as skirmishers before the brigade came up. The engagement immediately became furious and raged with unabated violence until 8 P. M.

The enemy's lines advanced within five paces of ours several times, but were on all points repulsed.

Having no support the brigade was not allowed to hazard their position by a charge until 12 P. M., when Walthall's brigade arrived and took possession immediately in its rear. A charge was then sounded and the brigade swept through the woods, breaking three lines of battle without firing a gun, and capturing many prisoners.

Barkham's regiment (Jovan's Brigade) was detached at five and a half P. M., and sent to the right of Granbury, who being out flanked, he arrived at the time of the change and drove the enemy.

Barkham's loss 28 killed and 25 wounded. Granbury's 26 killed and 120 wounded and 5 missing.

In Granbury's front the enemy left two hundred and eighty-eight killed on the field and a large number of wounded. These dead were all killed by Barkham's Arkansas regiment, which was separated from the front of Granbury's line at an interval of a hundred paces.

The loss in Granbury's immediate front was not less than three hundred killed, one thousand to twelve hundred wounded, and many captured.

Prisoners report Maj. Gen. Howard Johnson and Brig. Gen. King wounded.

Skirmishing continued until nightfall, the enemy constantly shifting the positions from centre to left.

RICHMOND, May 29.

The enemy crossed the Pamunky river yesterday at Hanover Town and Old Church.

Hancock's Wright's and Burnside's forces have certainly crossed—Warner's not accounted for.

MARIETTA, Sunday May 29. via Atlanta, May 30, New Hope, 29.

While Jackson's dismounted cavalry engaged the enemy last evening on our left, Gen. Bates was ordered to feel their position. He deployed his command as skirmishers, driving in those of the enemy and taking possession of their breastworks. He then ordered a charge but ascertaining the enemy to be in full force, he countermanded it. The order did not reach Lewis' brigades whose gallant 2d, 4th and 5th Kentucky rushed forward with great impetuosity and leaped the breastworks, when they found themselves confronted by Lingg's 15th army corps. One hundred and thirty of the regiments were killed, wounded and missing.

Gen. Beauregard attacked and pushed the enemy severely on yesterday near Drury's Bluff, capturing between 1,500 and 2,000 prisoners, and killing and wounding a very large number. Our loss in killed and wounded, supposed to be 2,000. All quiet to-day.
