Other Good Places Beside Post Offices.

In Alabama there are some good places in the internal revenue service. There are two collectors, one at Montgomery and one at Mobile, whose pay is \$2,500 a year each. The collector of the Montgomery District is allowed deputies at the following places: One at Montgomery with a salary of \$1,400; Huntsville, \$1,300; Decatur, \$1,200; Courtland, \$1,200; Beech Grove, \$1,200; Oxford, \$1,300; Prattville, \$1,200; Marion, \$2,200, and another at Montgomery at \$1,100 salary. Storekeepers are allowed at Maysville, Huntsville, Collinsville and Courtland at two and three dollars per day, and eight guineas are provided for at various points who are allowed fees. In the Mobile district deputies are allowed as follows: Mobile, one at \$1,400 salary and another at \$1,150; Camden, \$1,250; Tuscaloosa, \$1,250; Union Springs, \$1,450; Evergreen, \$1,350. There is one distillery surveyor who is allowed five dollars a day. In the customs service, Mobile has a collector whose pay is about \$4,000 a year; deputy collector and cashier, \$1,800; deputy collector and clerk \$1,600; clerk, \$1,400; and seventeen assistants of various grades who are paid from \$450 up to \$1,400. The register and the receiver of the land offices at Montgomery and Huntsville are allowed \$500 per annum, with fees and commissions as prescribed by law; the total not to exceed \$3,000 per annum. Two clerks are allowed in the Montgomery office at a salary of \$900 each.

The United States District Attorney at Montgomery is allowed a salary of \$200 a year and fees. Under Republican administration this office has paid about \$6,000 a year, being the most valuable Federal office in the State. To a Democratic incumbent it will probably be worth \$4,000. The Assistant District Attorney at Huntsville is allowed a stated salary of \$1,000. The Marshal of the Montgomery District has a stated salary of \$200 and fees. This office is probably worth \$3,500. The present Clerk of the United States Court at Montgomery may be able to hold his position, which probably pays upwards of \$2,000. The district attorneyship at Mobile is worth about \$4,000, and the marshalship of the Huntsville district is probably worth \$4,000. There are other places under this branch of the Federal government in Alabama of more or less value.

It may be well enough for aspirants for the "fat places" herein mentioned to get up strong petitions in their own behalf, but it is rather early for them to expect Senators and Representatives to take any definite steps in the matter of filling the various places. It is, in fact, too early for that. Senators and members may be committing themselves too early in the fight, for I know to the contrary; but I haven't heard of it. There are probably not a half dozen Democrats in the Senate and House combined who are not receiving scores and hundreds of letters from office-seekers; but all seem to be resting upon their oars. It will be two months and a half before there is such a person as President Cleveland, and it would not be healthy at present for any Senator or Congressman to approach the President-elect with reference to the filling of official places in any one of the States; and there are none who would be willing to do so.

When it comes to filling positions Mr. Cleveland will be governed mostly by his cabinet. Applications for judicial positions will be referred to the Attorney-General; for postoffices, to the Postmaster-General; and so on through the entire government service. Mr. Cleveland will be apt to appoint the persons recommended by members of his cabinet. So that if Senators and members should be ever so anxious to recommend friends, they cannot well do so until after the cabinet is formed, consequently office-seekers need be in no special hurry. They should cultivate the virtue patience. Democrats ought to know how to wait, inasmuch as they have been waiting nearly twenty-five years. An overwhelming majority of the American people feel that to the victors belong the spoils, and the people are right about it; and there can be no serious doubt about Cleveland's action. He will turn out the important Republican officials as soon as he can do so. Meanwhile, brethren, watch and pray and be calm.

ANOTHER LIE NAILED.

Hon. Jefferson Davis Says Something to Gen. Sherman.

St. Louis, Nov. 26.—At the opening of the new hall of the Frank P. Blair Post, G. A. R., a few days ago, General Sherman, in a speech, said:

"Jeff Davis was not a secessionist, he was a conspirator. I have seen letters from Davis to a man whose name I cannot mention, because he is a United States Senator. In one letter he said he would turn Lee's army against any State that might attempt to secede from the Southern Confederacy."

Mr. Davis writes a letter to the Republican, which says: "This public assault, under covered plea that it is based upon information which regard for a United States Senator does not permit him to present will, to honorable minds, suggest the idea of irresponsible slander." He continues to say that the allegations of his ever having written such a letter as is described, is unqualifiedly false, and the assertion that he had any purpose or wish to destroy the liberty and equal rights of any State, either North or South, is a reckless, shameless falsehood. It concludes: "If General Sherman has access to any letters purporting to have been written by me which will sustain his accusation, let him produce them or wear the brand of a base slanderer." General Sherman will make a statement in a short time.

Of course this letter called for a rejoinder from General Sherman, and the General's residence on Garrison avenue was visited to-day by newspaper representatives, all of whom he received in a courteous but not altogether friendly manner. He anticipated the leading question by remarking:

"I have read the letter of Jefferson Davis in this morning's paper, and I have nothing to say to the newspapers."

He laid down his pen, and turning in his chair, said, with that firm tone which showed that the subject had stirred up his ire:

"This is an affair between two gentlemen. I will take my time about it and write to Mr. Davis myself. We will settle the matter between us."

"Have the papers misrepresented you in your remarks before the Frank Blair Post, G. A. R.?" was asked.

"I say nothing about that. My reply to Mr. Davis will not be through the papers. They are not the arbiters of this question nor the go-between for any dispute. I have no more to say."

Hon. Samuel J. Randall will after the adjournment of congress for the holidays, make a trip through the south and west. When in Atlanta he was urgently requested to continue his tour in the south, but the pressure of official duties prevented. Should he come this way again his trip will be continuous ovation, for the remembrance of his manly defense of the people of the south when they needed true friends who were not afraid to express their convictions, finds a warm place in the hearts of every southerner.—Atlanta Constitution.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Mr. Cleveland will doubtless remember the lesson of history, that a kitchen cabinet generally cooks a president's goose.

Secretary Smalley, of the democratic national committee, thinks that Senator Bayard and William C. Whitney are looked for cabinet places.

Colonel A. S. Johnson was the first native of Kansas to be elected to the state legislature, and Mr. Edward P. Greer, just elected to that body, is the second. All other Kansas law-makers have been natives of other states.

The official vote of Dakota, just declared, will not increase its prospect of admission into the union. The vote is: Republican, 79,498; Democratic, 15,075; republican majority, 55,224. The Democrats carried one county only.

Prominent New Yorkers say that there is no chance for either Arthur or Conkling. The democrats will vote for Kernan. They think Morton, now minister of France, Representative Hisecock, and ex-Secretary Evans, are in the lead.

Ex-Governor "Dick" Bishop, of Ohio, denying some recent stories about himself, declares that he has not lost money in politics, having spent in the political field only \$5,000 in all. He failed in business last year, but has since succeeded in making himself financially comfortable.
